

DeFazio Says it's up to Smith By Evan Kramer

Congressman Peter DeFazio held a town hall meeting in Port Orford last Wednesday and played to a packed house at city hall.

He began the meeting with a summary of issues including the war in Iraq. He referred to President Bush's recent press conference on the war and said that Bush's statement that we will be staying in Iraq indefinitely was the wrong message. DeFazio said we needed to draw down our forces in Iraq. He said that country needed to solve their own differences.

He said the recent arrest of several terrorist suspects in Britain was a good way of doing things. He said this country needed machines to test liquids that go on planes as well as a device to test persons who have used explosives recently or who have them on them.

He said only 5% of the cargo containers coming into this country from overseas were inspected and the Democrats had offered an amendment to screen 100% of the containers from overseas. He continued that among others Wal-Mart didn't want it so it didn't get passed.

DeFazio spoke about oil company profits which have gone from \$34 billion in

2002 to \$113 billion this year. He has introduced a bill to re-impose the windfall profits tax on the oil companies but they can get around that if they reinvest in new technology, new fuels and building new refineries. DeFazio offered a chart which showed how gas prices could be reduced from \$3.10 a gallon to \$2.13. He said 62 cents per gallon could be saved by regulating the crude oil market and eliminating speculation and another 35 cents could be saved by expanding the refinery capacity.

DeFazio then opened up the meeting to questions beginning with one from Scott Luhr, Port Commission chairman. He explained to DeFazio about the shoaling problem at the Port and that our window to dredge the Port is narrowing. He said the Port employs 10% of the people in Port Orford and without dredging we're facing closing the Port. He told DeFazio we need help getting the different agencies to work together to get the dredging done. DeFazio said he was perfectly willing to help and urged Luhr to speak with his aid Carmen Fore with more of the details which Luhr had already done.

Curry County Commissioner Lucie LaBonte noted that the dredge barge Sandwick is mothballed and asked about getting it back in service. DeFazio said he would do everything he can but we were


fighting the influence of the private dredging industry.

DeFazio was asked how serious election fraud was and he said we don't know but the potential is vast. He said it was absurd we don't require a paper ballot to go with the electronic voting machines. He also said there are no federal standards for voting and that they are made on a state level.

DeFazio was questioned about the booming economy. He said we borrow \$1.4 billion a day or \$500 billion a year to run our government. He said half the debt is being bought by foreign interests. He said that the Bush administration has accumulated more foreign debt than all other Presidents in history. He went on to talk about the amount of goods that are produced in China that are pirated from the United States.

The fate of the Copper Salmon Wilderness proposal was directed to DeFazio. He said if Senator Gordon Smith would agree to it, it would be in the wilderness bill. He continued that if the Democrats get control of Congress this November Copper Salmon will be in the next year's wilderness bill. This year it's up to Senator Smith. If Copper Salmon gets in the Senate Bill it would then be "confer-

enceable" since it was not included in the House Wilderness Bill which was recently passed.

DeFazio talked about the current salmon fishery disaster with the closure of most of the salmon season. He said we need to fix or forget about the Klamath River. He explained the big problem with the Klamath is the diversion of cold Trinity River water to the south instead of it flowing into the Klamath.

DeFazio said if the Democrats get control of the House he would get a good committee chairmanship. He is part of the 62 member progressive caucus in the House and said they planned to use pressure to promote their ideas if the Democrats take control, just as a group of some 50 ultra conservative Republicans are exerting now on Congress.

DeFazio was asked about the high and low points in his near 20 years in the House of Representatives and replied that the high point was last year's passage of the Transportation Bill (official-

ly known as the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users), and the low point was the House vote for the war in Iraq which he said has turned out worse than he could have predicted. He was very proud of his participation in the Transportation bill which resulted in Oregon receiving more money in federal highway funds than it contributes in federal gas taxes. The bill will bring \$2.7 billion to Oregon for highway and transit projects from 2005-2010 and create over 127,000 jobs.

The dapper and fit looking DeFazio is running for an eleventh term in Congress and is not in what is considered a "contested" race.

CCEC Continues to Profit By Evan Kramer

The Coos Curry Electric Coop board met on Friday morning with all six members present as well as their Portland lawyer Michael Hanlon.

The board begins their agenda with comments from the public and was asked about the status of the base (meter) rate,

energy conservation program and outsourcing. Board chairman Daryl Robison said something would be done on the rates by October but the rates need to be trued up by the Bonneville Power Administration. He said the board supports an energy conservation program. He said the board hasn't taken any action on the programs which have been outsourced but before they do they need to know the cost effectiveness.

Rick Hazard asked about a solar rebate program for residential and business users. General Manager Werner Buehler said the Coop has an existing policy to purchase solar power. Hazard estimated it would cost between \$15,000 and \$20,000 for a solar system inter-tie with the Coop

Don Jensen told the board that the Oregon Legislature passed a bill in 1981 that all publicly owned utilities have to participate in weatherization programs (ORS 469.651). He said that law had not been rescinded.

The board approved the consent calendar with one dissenting vote from board member Gary Schlottman. He didn't like the way the list of general and operating checks was presented to the board and said he wanted more information on them before voting. Werner Buehler will include a "key" to accompany the next list of checks and explain them better.

Werner Buehler under payroll expenses told the board the Coop is spending more money to maintain the system than building the system. He said when you capitalize you're building your asset.

Frank Corrales gave the Form 7 financial report. Net income before tax through the first seven months of this year is \$2.657 million. The budgeted net income was \$.889 million for the first seven months. Net income for July was \$261,000 while net budgeted income was \$119,000.

Under staff reports Board member David Itzen said the Coop was short a lineman which he described as a serious problem. Board member John Herzog said he no-

ticed Jensen Tree Service doing more work in the southern end of the Coop and Buehler told him they were picking up deferred maintenance.

Daryl Robison reported on the strategic planning meeting held in Gold Beach two weeks ago. He said he was very encouraged by the discussion and described some of the items discussed as the meter charge, financial impact of any changes so the board can plan appropriately, the power true up from Bonneville which is needed before any adjustments can be made, the Round Up program, cash flow, meeting locations, capital credit retirements and power supply which he described as the most important on the list.

The policy review committee consisting of all board members is working on several policies including line extension and records access.

The board discussed the monthly safety report and Gary Schlottman asked about reimbursement for a Bow-Flex machine. Buehler told him the Coop pays employees to stay healthy and the purchase was made under the health and wellness pro-

gram. Buehler said the Coop has a self insurance program so it pays for employees to be healthy.

John Herzog made a motion to accept the description of duties and responsibilities for the board chairman as amended and it passed unanimously.

The board discussed the upcoming budget and budget workshops. Buehler said there were significant issues and the board should cover chunks of it separately culminating in a final workshop where the budget is voted on. He said the transmission line to Brookings is the number one issue. Daryl Robison suggested the board set a date for conclusion of these items. Monday, November 13 was set as the date for the final budget hearing and conclusion of the process. We'll know by that date if there is going to be a reduction in the base meter rate or not.

The board will hold member meetings in all four districts throughout the year. They will include question and answer sessions with the public. All board members are invited to attend but it is not mandatory. There will be a meeting in each district once a year.

Daryl Robison spoke of including a letter from the board in with the next billing. It will be a report to the members and include a schedule of events. The board next meets on Friday, September 29, 10:00am.

County Zoning Change

Curry County is considering amendments to the Curry County Comprehensive Plan and Curry County Zoning Ordinance that will allow two (2) acre lots or parcels in the Rural Residential (RR) zones. The matter will be before the Curry County Board of Commissioners for a public hearing that is scheduled for Tuesday, September 5, at 1:30 pm in the Commissioners' Hearing Room, Courthouse Annex, 94235 Moore Street, Gold Beach, Oregon.

The proposed ordinance and text amendments may be found on the County's website at <http://www.co.curry.or.us/> under "Recent and Proposed Ordinance Changes." The location of parcels that are most likely to be affected by the ordinance may be found on the "Curry County GIS Enterprise, Assessor's Office." The parcels that were identified have a zoning designation of Rural Residential (either RR-10 or RR-5); are of a size between 4 and 10 acres; were within a Rural Exception area as of February 1989; and are not in an urban growth boundary.

Letter to the editor,

On Sept. 5, the county commissioners will again consider their proposal to weaken our county general plan. In place for 24 years, this public document has guided growth with little conflict and has served us well. But the proposal would expedite suburbanization of rural areas where homesites are now zoned for 5 or 10 acres.

At a time when county government is broke, the new proposal would add to taxpayer costs by increasing the needs for roads, services, and public safety. At a time when wildfires are worsening, the proposal would heighten hazards by promoting development in remote areas. It would make our county less rural and more suburban—less like it is and more like everywhere else. It would diminish the property values of people who don't want to live amid rural sprawl.

At the commissioners' first hearing, only two people spoke in favor of the change—both realtors from Brookings. Our organization of 175 members spoke against the change, itemized our concerns, and asked questions. We received no response.

They said that only developed areas are affected, but in fact the change applies to 8,000 acres—all of them outside existing urban growth boundaries.

Curry County already has enough land zoned for development to accommodate many times the total county population. Our plan was carefully written with wide public participation; to weaken it is to weaken our future and to erode our property values. We urge the commissioners to table this wasteful, ill-conceived, and indefensible proposal and get back to the business of running our county well.

The end of the fiscal year at Port Orford Public Library always brings about a flurry of reports, one of which is the Oregon Public Library Statistical Report, filled with heady facts and figures. For example:

We were open 2,117 hours last year, during which time 22,766 people visited and 27,217 items were checked out. The incredibly knowledgeable front desk volunteers and staff answered 3,175 reference questions, just part of the duties performed during the 3,311 hours of volunteer time. That's right, 41 volunteers gave 3,311 hours of their time to the Port Orford Public Library!

And that count is low because it does not include hours donated by the members of the Library and Foundation Boards or the Friends group. I truly believe our

volunteers are the backbone of our library (the 3-member paid staff also donate many hours each year). Speaking of donations, 485 donated items, valued at \$9,021, were added to our collections. Thank you generous people for offsetting our book and audio-visual budget.

We transacted 716 inter-library loans, providing our patrons with an even broader selection than can be found among the 24,826 items housed in our jam-packed facility. Believe it or not, the free public Internet service was used 9,427 times and 1,701 adults and children attended our programs (many of which were co-sponsored with Langlois Library).

Thank you everyone for supporting Port Orford Public Library in so many ways. We look forward to many years of service, but just one more year in our cozy old library, and then look out—we will experience a statistical explosion.

I am excited at the prospect of working in a field where I can be even more effective and hopefully, provide assistance to those in need. My practice will focus on protecting futures through asset protection and estate planning, business and elder law. I am already setting appointments for October.

Finally, I do not leave the office without a bright future. At least two highly qualified candidates will seek to obtain the position. With my policies and procedures in place, the office should continue to serve the community.

Thank you again, Curry County for your support and the privilege of serving as your District Attorney. It has truly been an honor.


