Idaho Continues to Stop

Chamber Hands Out Awards By Evan Kramer

The North Curry and Port Orford Chamber of Commerce held their annual awards dinner on Saturday night and many people from the community were honored.

Chamber president David Smith kicked off the evening by welcoming Chamber members and guests. Smith talked about lots of good things going on with the Chamber and how former Chamber president Jay Stoler had been a mentor to him. Smith talked about the importance of bringing high speed Internet to Port Orford and how it could bring more businesses here.

Smith thanked each of the Battle Rock Park Visitor Center volunteers who were all given a certificate of appreciation. They included Ann Goetzman, Mark Murray, Elaina Bailey, Trish and Steve Hanrahan (not present), Millie North, Kay Neal and Dede Miller.

A special Santa's Helper award was given to Josh Voshall for playing the role of Santa Clause for the Chamber. He wasn't present as he is in training for his job as smoke jumper/firefighter but his parents accepted the award. The Chamber handed out a North Curry County Award and \$75 gift certificate to the Langlois Lion's Club.

Curt Brown accepted the award for the Lion's Club.

David Smith announced a Spirit of Giving Award to Judy Tree, manager of Ray's Place Market, for always donating to local causes. Chamber board member Chuck Schaumburg was given an Extra Efforts Award for his work on behalf of promoting the Chamber up and down the state.

Smith said that Gold Beach had won the lighting contest the Gold Beach and Port Orford Chambers sponsor between the two cities each year. Our Chamber handed out awards for local lighting efforts with the first place award in the business category going to the Cape Blanco RV Park for their Christmas lighting display while Mary O. Loan was awarded second place. In the residential category for Port Orford the Keeler family won a \$50 gift certificate for second place and the Voshall's won a \$100 gift certificate from Jerry's Rogue Jets for first place.

Smith explained there were 65 voting members in the Chamber and that many had sent in their votes for several awards. The board considered their votes and then made the final decision. There was a three way tie for Organization of the Year. It was shared by the Friends of the Port Orford Library, the Port Orford Arts Council, and the Port Orford Rotary Club.

Jay Stoler received a well deserved standing ovation when he was announced as Volunteer of the Year. Stoler has served as past president and vice president of the Chamber and has also served as the public "voice" of the Chamber through his numerous articles in the newspapers. He contributes work to many local organization's web sites. Stoler said that Viola Cuatt had got him involved with the Chamber when he moved to Port Orford in 1997.

The next award handed out was the Wilbur Green Lifetime Achievement Award. It went to Frank Smith and was greeted with a heartfelt standing ovation. Smith is the owner of the Port and Starboard Restaurant and his list of community activities includes being an active member of the Rotary Club, American Legion, and long time member of the Port Orford Planning Commission.

The Business of the Year went to the Wooden Nickel, owned by Milton Reeves. David Smith then announced that Viola Cuatt had won the President's Choice Award for her outstanding community service. Cuatt was involved with the Chamber for a number of years as well as being a long time member of the Curry County Fair Board and Port Orford Planning Commission. She was one of the

founders of the Port Orford Chamber of Commerce. Cuatt was not present to accept her award. Mayor Jim Auburn was at the dinner and had a plaque from the City for Viola Cuatt thanking her for her many years on the planning commission, including ten as chairperson.

David Smith thanked Sonja Mason for her fine efforts in making the delicious dinner and the meeting concluded with announcement of many upcoming events in Port Orford. Planning Commission News by Jay Stoler

The Port Orford Planning Commission held a short workshop last Thursday to discuss several issues that they are working on.

Chairman Dave Holman opened the meeting with the surprising news that Frank

Smith had resigned from the Planning Commission. Smith had been on the Commission for many years and was Vice-Chairman.

The vacancy leaves two openings on the Commission, both of which may be filled with citizens that live within the Urban Growth Boundary or the city limits of Port Orford.

Newly appointed members Bill McArdle and Micki Snider as well as veterans Joyce Kinney and Ken Gibson were also present, as was assistant planner and Secretary Patty Clark.

The Commission discussed several different areas including annexation ordinances, lot line adjustments and partitions and sub-division ordinances and the direction they may want to take.

Assistant planner Clark said there were certain conditions of annexation that the city had to meet before it could do a voluntary annexation. She said the Commission may have to revise some ordinances to facilitate those kinds of transactions.

The Commission also spoke about clearing up some wording on ordinances like; only being allowed to split property "once in a five-year period." The members had several different interpretations of what that meant. Did it apply to just one owner or did the clock start over with a property sale?

Seeking clarity and a better understanding of the tasks before them was the prevalent attitude of the focused group. Being a workshop no motions were made, although they said they would continue to discuss the matters at regular meetings

They adjourned after about 75 minutes.

The Crew of the FV Ash By Carol Berger

One of the things that most touched me at the memorial service for the crew of the FV Ash last month was the poem read by Louis Lobo's Aunt Mary from the Isle-of-Man in Great Britain. I thought it so beautiful and comforting that I asked Perry Rask whether, if she got a copy from Mary, she would send it on to me. Having received the copy, I decided to see if I could find out who might have written the poem.

Submitting my question on Yahoo Answers, I got the almost immediate response that the author was Henry Scott Holland (1847-1918), who was Canon of St. Paul's Cathedral in England. Further research led me to discover that it was actually part of a sermon written and delivered by Holland, upon the death of King Edward VII. The poem is sometimes referred to as "What is Death?" and can be found in several slightly different versions. Educated at Oxford, Holland was a prominent theologian and one of London's greatest nineteenth-century preachers. He had several books published.

I shared this information with Perry, who thought that others might be interested in

the origin of the poem. She suggested I write something about it and include the poem for anyone else who would like a copy of it:

Death is Nothing at All

Death is nothing at all.
I have only slipped away into the next room.
I am I, and you are you.
Whatever we were to each other,
that we still are.

Call me by my old familiar name.
Speak to me in the easy way
which you always used.
Put no difference in your tone.
Wear no forced air of solemnity or sorrow.

Laugh as we always laughed
at the little jokes we enjoyed together.
Play, smile, think of me, pray for me.
Let my name be ever the household word
that it always was.
Let it be spoken without effect,
without the trace of a shadow on it.

Life means all that it ever meant.
It is the same as it ever was.
There is absolutely unbroken



continuity.
Why should I be out of mind
because I am out of sight?

I am waiting for you,
for an interval,
somewhere very near,
just around the corner.

All is well.

Apparently, Holland thought a lot about death, as I found another poem he had written, called "Death," which could have been written about the crew of the FV Ash, and which I would like to share, in the hope that it, too, might help bring comfort.

Death

I am standing on the seashore.
A ship spreads her white sails to the morning breeze and starts for the ocean.
I stand watching her until she fades on the horizon,
and someone at my side says,
"She is gone."

Gone where?

The loss of sight is in me, not in her.
Just at the moment when someone says,
"She is gone,"
there are others who are watching her coming.
Other voices take up the glad shout,
"Here she comes,"
and that is dying.

No Changes To Idaho Street by Jay Stoler

The Port Orford City Council voted not to make any changes in the way the stop signs are set up on Idaho Street at their monthly meeting. The Planning Commission had sent the Council a Transportation Plan that recommended Idaho become a "non-stop" collector route to ease the local usage of Highway 101.

Councilor Jim Campbell felt it would only create another "speedway" situation like Jackson Street, which has no stop signs from 101 to 25th Street. Campbell, Eskelson and Finch voted no and Abbott and Hewitt voted yes. Newly elected councilor Jake Marshall was absent due to being on an ODOT crew that was called out on an emergency.

The council unanimously passed the Transportation Plan recommendation to put an additional stop sign at Deady Street and Cemetery Loop Road.

The Council also changed the requirements to be on the Planning Commission to all members having to live in Port Orford or the Urban Growth Boundary to qualify. This replaces a six-mile rule made before the UGB was created.

In other City Council news:

- Jim Campbell was elected council president and would serve as Mayor in the Mayor's absence. Campbell has been council president in the past and has been on the council since the 80's.
- Police Chief Mark Creighton said the city needed to create a fund to make undercover drug purchases. He said there are citizens willing to donate this money, but a line item needs to be created on the budget. The Chief also said that two good video cameras had been donated from the Brookings Police department.
- The Council changed the Public Safety subcommittee meeting to the first Tuesday of the month at 5pm and the Public Works subcommittee meeting to the first Wednesday of the month.
- The Public Works report noted that the water leakage for last month was back up to 56 percent. Administrator Mike Murphy said a leakage detection company would be in town as soon as weather conditions were right and they would try and find the main source of the leaks.
- Murphy also announced that another Public Works staffer resigned, effective

at the end of the month. That leaves two openings in Public Works.

- The Council unanimously approved a new application form to be used for city Committees and Task Forces and other volunteer positions with the city. The form is virtually the same one as the county uses and requires a lot of information from the applicant.
- The Council unanimously approved a memo of Agreement between the Lower rogue and South Coast Watershed Council and specific landowners for fish habitat restoration.
- The Council unanimously approved county Economic Development Director Susan Brown as the Enterprise Zone manager.
- Jim Campbell said that the city needed a way to collect Court Fees to help pay for the Municipal Court. The Council also discussed changing some other rules pertaining to the court and judge.
- Went into Executive session for seven minutes to discuss documents exempt from the public record with City Attorney John Trew.

Port Commission Meeting

The Port of Port Orford Commission met on Tuesday night, January 16, at the Port Office with the two main issues under discussion being dredging and the third buyer's station.

The Commission spent nearly half the meeting discussing dredging and decided they wanted a solution to the problem, not another study about the shoaling and sanding in problems at the Port. Commissioner Ed Dowdy had prepared a report on four major dredging studies conducted over the years and potential solutions to the shoaling problem.

Port Manager Gary Anderson said the Port needed the best technology to get the job done, not another study. Ed Dowdy said Gary Anderson needs a paper on the dredging problem which will give him traction with the Congressional delegation when he goes to Washington in March.

Anderson said the State of Oregon is helping the Port out with the dredging problem and is interested in the Port's financial well being. He said he thought the state would find a solution but the

Army Corps of Engineers would need to buy into it. He said the Port needed an engineer's recommendation for the most cost efficient method to keep the Port open. The Port is looking at a submersible pump as the preferred method for keeping the Port dredged.

The third buyer's station/hoist is for lease now that Starvin' Marvin Seafood's has moved out. Hallmark Fisheries and Norcal Fisheries are both interested in leasing the third hoist. In addition the Port Orford Ocean Resources Team is promoting a plan for a commercial fisheries/public hoist. Commissioner Bob Mielenz spoke about his concerns with Port liability with a public hoist and proper training for people using the hoist. An increase in dockage fees by the fishermen is proposal to pay for the hoist which past leaseholders have paid over \$6,000 a year to lease. Dockage fee for the fishing boats would go from \$200 to \$215 per month to pay for the hoist. Manager Gary Anderson will work on getting the insurance costs as well as the cost of getting the hoist ready to go and the Commission will take up the issue again before the end of this month.

The Commission voted to approve a motion raising fees on sport boat users for hoisting at the Port. The fees for sport boats will go from \$15 to \$20 for boats that don't need the sling and from \$25 to \$30 for boats that require use of the sling.

Sheriff Metcalf Arraigned

Curry County Sheriff Mark Metcalf was indicted by the Curry County Grand Jury on eleven counts two week's ago. They include four counts of sexual abuse in the third degree; four counts of harassment, and three counts of official misconduct. He was arraigned at the Curry County Jail on January 16 and released.

The following is a statement issued by Curry County Sheriff Mark Metcalf. "The arraignment of Sheriff Metcalf today in Curry County Circuit court was the result of a Grand Jury proceeding that occurred last week.

For those of you that are not aware, a Grand Jury proceeding is done in secret by the State and the Defendant has no chance to be represented by counsel; present witnesses on his behalf or even cross examine any of the State's witnesses. In short, a Grand Jury indictment is not a conviction.

I am obviously unable to discuss or address any specifics of the allegations made against me, but I am asking the citizens of Curry County for the opportunity to present my case to a jury in a court of law.

No one has more respect for the Office of Sheriff than I do. The "Office" is bigger than any Sheriff that holds it; past, present or future.

If anyone in my employ were in a similar circumstance I would place them on administrative leave pending the outcome of the criminal case. It is for these reasons that I will myself be on leave pending the outcome of the case against me.

My office has a well defined chain of command and Captain Allen Boice will assume command in my absence."

Fisherman's Body Identified

On December 16, the Fishing Vessel Ash sank near the mouth of the Rogue River in Gold Beach. Four crewmembers were missing and presumed drowned.

On December 26, human remains were recovered from the beach approximately five miles north of Gold Beach. Since that time, Sheriff's Deputies have been working with family members and the State Medical Examiner's Office attempting to identify this body. Family members of the missing crewmen assisted by locating dental X-rays, which were submitted to the State Medical Examiner's Office in Central Point, Oregon.

On January 17, the Curry County Sheriff's Office was notified that the Medical Examiner's Office had identified the remains as: Louis Thomas Lobo, age 39, Brookings resident

Members of the Lobo family, as well as family members of the remaining missing crewmen have been notified of the identification.

Letter to the Editor,

Mr. Kolen, in his letter to the Editor on January 13th, stated that a good part of the funds allowing for a rate reduction came from cutting nearly \$400,000 from the tree trimming budget. He also states that deferred tree trimming only pushes these costs to the future.

I have not seen Mr. Kolen, a former board member, at any board meetings since the new board members were elected which leads me to believe that he must be getting his information from another source. That source has misinformed Mr. Kolen because the current tree trimming budget is higher than during Mr. Kolen's tenure and NO money was taken from tree trimming to allow a reduction in the Monthly Meter Charge (MMC). The 2007 budget for tree trimming is over \$1,600,000, perhaps the highest it has ever been.

Interestingly enough in September, 2004 when Mr. Kolen was still on the board, tree trimming was curtailed by all sub-contractors to cut expenses. This resulted in a number (6 as I recall, perhaps more) employees of the tree trimming companies being laid-off and the only trimming done was by employees of CCEC.

Park Closes for Construction

Tseriadun State Recreation Site in Port Orford will be closed starting Monday, January 22, while the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD) constructs an outfall for Garrison Lake to the ocean. The closure is expected to remain in effect until June 30, 2007.

The new drainage system is intended to reduce flooding from the lake's overflow during storms. Past overflows have flooded local areas, breached the spit separating the lake and ocean, and eroded park resources.

A culvert built under the parking lot at the park will carry overflow from the lake to an open stream channel that empties into the ocean. The channel will be lined with river rock to simulate a natural streambed and protected by erosion control measures, such as hydroseeding along its slopes.

Laskey-Clifton of Reedsport is the contractor for the \$1.2 million project, which is being funded by OPRD's share of Oregon Lottery dollars.

Tseriadun State Recreation Site is on the south shore of Garrison Lake just north of Port Orford Heads. OPRD purchased

the 42-acre site, known locally in the past as Agate Beach RV Park, for a day-use beach access in May, 2003.
