School District Transitions By Evan Kramer

The Port Orford-Langlois School District Board met on Monday night and heard a presentation from Jan Hodder. She is a marine biologist with the University of Oregon working at the Institute of Marine Biology in Charleston. Hodder spoke about a marine biology program for our school district for grades kindergarten through sixth grade. Graduate students at the Institute will work with local teachers in the classroom and cover subjects from ponds to rocky shores to islands.

Gail from Murray Insurance presented the board with quotes for their insurance policies for 2007/08 covering the buildings and vehicles among other things. She said there had been a dramatic increase in replacement costs for buildings and contents and estimated the replacement value at \$15,955,000 for the district. The premium for the 2007/08 year will be \$39,000.

The board discussed a retreat they will have on June 19. It will be held in the meeting room of an area motel and last from 9:00am to 3:00pm. A representative from the Oregon School Boards Association will lead the retreat which will include topics like board member roles and responsibilities and goal setting.

Sidonie Rhodes stepped in to fill the role of high school counselor this year replacing Jerry Cox who has been ill. Superintendent Ruby Price thanked Rhodes for the job she has done. Rhodes was asked about the amount of scholarship money awarded Pacific High School students and she said \$111,000. She referred to this amount as "what they are using" since some students receive scholarships they don't use.

Ruby Price said the Governor's budget has been passed and the "money is there" for the district for the next school year.

Maintenance and Transportation Supervisor John Penifold discussed the Driftwood Elementary School safety issue. An original plan was to use the school's front lawn as a parking area/drop-off zone for school buses and parents. That plan was dropped after the May 10 public meeting at Driftwood because of public opposition. Another meeting was held on May 23 at the school and six alternative plans were presented by members of the public and one school board member. The overwhelming consensus opinion was in favor of board member Bruce Stannard's plan. This one places the emphasis on Thirteenth Street where there will be a dedicated bus zone adjacent to the school entry door. Next to bus zone will be a public drop-off zone which will be divided from the bus zone by either a fence or

concrete barrier. There will be a crosswalk at the "top" of the unloading/loading zones and a school aid will be on hand to monitor it. Thirteenth Street will become a one way street (east bound) and Tichenor will become a one way (northbound) street if the City of Port Orford goes along with the plan. The principal's office will remain near the Highway 101 entrance and there will be security cameras installed at the Thirteenth Street door, and one at the back entrance for people entering the school by wheelchair. Penifold estimated the cost of these changes at \$5,000. The District is under a directive from the Oregon Department of Education to correct the situation and make it safer.

There are going to be many personnel changes in the school district for the 2007/08 year including Athletic Director Tom Dill who has resigned and is going to Myrtle Point High School to serve as vice-principal. Teachers Cheryl and Gareth Pooleon have resigned and are moving to Portland. Vocational Education

teacher Tony LaPlante has resigned and will go back into business in the private sector. Tiffany Frietag is resigning her position as Instructional Assistant and will become the new Athletic Director. James Frietag has resigned. Dwain Lakey has resigned and taken a position with Coos-Curry Electric Cooperative. Robert Tiffany has been hired and will work to "build up the Arts Program at Pacific High School."

The most difficult part of the meeting for the board were the two requests from families with children living in the Port Orford/Langlois School District to either keep their children in the Bandon School District or enroll them in that district. The mothers of both sets of children presented their cases earlier in the meeting and the board returned to the subject towards the end of the meeting. The board voted in both instances to deny the requests for the interdistrict transfers. School Board president Joe Brown said this was the toughest part of the job for him. The main reasons given for denying the interdistrict

transfers were the families live within the Port Orford/Langlois district and that this district can provide an exceptional quality education and meet the needs of the children. Superintendent Price told the board that many requests for interdistrict transfers are handled by her and resolved thus not needing to go before the board.

Klamath Salmon Crisis


An informational exposé on the Klamath River Salmon Crisis will be held on June 22 5:30-7:00pm at the Port Orford Savoy Theatre. "Please join us to learn more about the Klamath River Dams and their negative cultural and socioeconomic impact on tribes, fisheries, and communities", notes commercial fisherman Aaron Longton. "Historically, people have become complacent and these issues have been hidden in the shadows and not addressed. This is not acceptable. We're starting a movement in Port Orford to tell the story and promote change."

Guest speaker is Merv George, Klamath River Inter-Tribal Fish and Water Commission Administrator and a member of

the Hoopa tribe. Mr George will present a movie "Solving The Klamath River Crisis, Keeping Farms and Fish Alive" and provide information about the work the tribes have done to improve the situation. He will speak about their "Bring the Salmon Home campaign" to help salmon return to the upper basin.

The Klamath salmon closure has a complex and wide-spread impact in Oregon from reductions in tourism due to area closures for recreational salmon fishermen, to entire ocean closures for commercial fishermen. "The impact to Port Orford alone is felt by hundreds of people in our community," said Longton. "From the grocery store where fishing families buy their food, all the way to the motels that provide lodging for recreational fishermen. Commercial fishermen suffered a complete ocean salmon closure in 2006. This was the first time in 100 years we were completely excluded from salmon fishing due to the Klamath problems". The tribes have their own unique problems and issues which Mr George will talk about at the forum.

Dam Shame

A film and discussion about the Klamath River salmon crisis will be held at the Savoy Theater in Port Orford on Friday, June 22, at 5:30pm. The free event features Merv George, Klamath River Inter-Tribal Fish and Water Commission Administrator and a member of the Hoopa tribe, and Aaron Longton, Port Orford commercial fisherman and is hosted by the Port Orford Ocean Resource Team.

The Klamath River was once the third most productive salmon fishery in America, behind only the Columbia and Sacramento rivers. The river has been in steady decline since it was dammed more than 80 years ago. Reduced water flow resulting in poor water quality, along with algae and aquatic parasites that thrive in such conditions have reduced Klamath salmon to 10% of their historical numbers.

Earlier this year, the federal agencies charged with relicensing four hydro-power dams on the river ruled that PacifiCorp must invest \$300 million to build screens and fish ladders before finalizing renewal. These changes are so expensive that it makes better financial

sense for the PacifiCorp to remove the dams and buy market rate electricity. Government officials estimate that dam removal, meeting water quality standards and funding hatchery operations would save rate payers between \$100,000,000 and \$285,000,000 over 30 years when compared to the cost of ladders.

PacifiCorp says they may invest in the ladders; they could also appeal the licensing decision. But the data marshaled by the government agencies would be hard to dispute said Steve Rothert of the conservation group American Rivers, "if they're going to make a decision that makes sense for their customers, they will remove the dams."

The collapse of the Klamath River has affected the entire west coast. Coastal communities depend on salmon fishing income to support their fishing families and local businesses. In Port Orford, commercial fishermen landed half a million dollars worth of salmon in 2005. In 2006 the Klamath Management Zone fishery, which encompasses Port Orford, was closed to commercial fishing for the first time in 100 years. Every dollar spent in our local economy recirculates four times. With 25% of our town's workforce being

fisheries related, it would be reasonable to assume everyone is affected. Motels, gas stations, RV parks and our local restaurants are all feeling the pinch. This is the case in all Oregon coastal communities. While hydroelectric power is a clean, emission free source of power, in the case of the Klamath, the socioeconomic and cultural consequences outweigh its benefits.

The beauty of the salmon is their true resilience. Time and time again, it has been shown that when spawning habitat is restored and reopened salmon immediately repopulate the area.

Water Leaks Detected

The City of Port Orford hired American Leak Detection of Medford to survey its water delivery system for leaks. That company provided the work last week and found at least two leaks. One is at the Port of Port Orford and the other in on Ninth Street between Highway 101 and Tichenor. The City public works crew began excavating the sites on Tuesday morning. The City has been losing 50% and more of its treated water every month and last month lost 64%. Let's hope they found the source of the water losses.

Mark Murray was elected as the vice-president/vice-chair, of the Port Orford Parks Commission at Tuesday night's meeting by the other Commissioners. Murray has been serving as a Parks Commissioner for the last seven months. Jim Billings is Chairman.

Millie North has rejoined the Parks Commission and was present as well as Commissioners Jodi Bulaich, Laurie Bourba, and Council liaison, Milton Finch.

The Mayor gave the Commission a volunteer "pep talk" and reminded everyone to take their obligations seriously.

The Mayor also awarded a plaque of service to Park Host Kay Hobson on behalf of the Parks Commission. Hobson

has been serving for the last six months as the host at Buffington Park and will be returning to Montana. She was also awarded a \$50 gift certificate and the heart felt thanks of the Commissioners for all the time and extra effort she put into the Park. Hobson said she enjoyed the work, especially interfacing with the kids at the skate bowl and the other people who use the Park regularly.

Chairman Billings said that a 100 x 300 foot indoor arena building was being looked at as a possible indoor Horse Arena for Buffington Park. At the \$318,000 price tag alone for the building, not including the interior, he said that he would have to come up with a large grant from a big sponsor to pull it off.

The Commission will purchase three No Dogs Please signs to be posted at the

Ball Field. The pets have been relieving themselves illegally on the field, causing potential health problems for the little leaguers and kids that play on the field. The Commission is in favor of vigorous prosecution for offenders of this long standing problem.

A total of \$400 was donated to the Little League from a \$250 Wal-Mart donation and \$150 from the Parks Commission.

The Parks Commission will pursue the community rummage sale idea and will try and refine the presentation and combine it with a produce market.

The Parks Commission meets the first Tuesday of the month, except for July, they will meet on Thursday, July 5, 2007 at 7pm in City Hall.

Letter to the Editor,

My husband and I recently spent a welcome five-day break in Port Orford, staying in the most westerly motel in the Pacific Northwest. During the day, we hiked or biked in different areas in the region during the day and sampled different restaurants each evening. We had good seafood in all of them and, on one of the evenings, the best Marion pie we have ever tasted.

Salads were varied and not too dependent on iceberg lettuce, cabbage and bulk carrots and it was possible to get meals that were not too enormous or "padded out" with unmanageable quantities of fries. However, there is one change that we, and possibly many visitors, would like to see added to your local menus: a local vinaigrette dressing. Gone are the days when people traveling up and down the 101 will be content with the French-Italian-Ranch-Blue cheese options. Any decent restaurant in Portland or California will have some kind of vinaigrette on the menu. Handing people a bottle of cooking oil and the kind of vinegar I use to clean my wood floors lowers the tone of your local restaurants and reduces Port Orford's credibility as a serious place to stop on a pacific coast vacation. Restaurateurs, here is a basic vinaigrette that can be whipped up in your blenders in the evening. Add the juice of crushed cranberries (not Ocean Spray please!) and you will have something unique to your area.

VINAIGRETTE DRESSING

(12 servings)

4 tablespoons red wine/balsamic vinegar

12 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil

1 teaspoon salt

Freshly ground black pepper to taste

1 clove crushed/chopped garlic or onion

2 teaspoons Dijon mustard

Blend and serve same day.

State Parks Update

Oregon State Parks have done some maintenance work on two of their local parks including Cape Blanco State Park and Humbug Mountain State Park.

State Parks hired Joe Marsh to rock and grade the road at Cape Blanco State Park

leading down to the beach. It had been in terrible condition for several years but with the addition of several loads of rock, a new culvert and some grading the road is now usable again by beach legal vehicles.

Several years ago at Humbug Mountain State Park the bridge over one of the creeks on the Old Highway 101 trail was washed out and destroyed. This creek moves a lot of water so the bridge is an important one and two weeks ago it was replaced with a 70 foot long concrete bridge with railings. Hikers will now not have to scramble down the hillside and through the creek to get across – not easy to do at all in winter. The Old Highway 101 trail is a great 3 mile hike that takes you from the beginning of the campground up the hill and then along a ridge overlooking the new Highway 101 and the ocean and comes out south of Rocky Point.



“He who fails to plan -- plans for failure.”

So we planned and planned and planned. In 2006, Shoji Consultants held a series of workshops wherein the community provided many hours of hard work and input. Surveys were filled out by hundreds of people and Phase I of the “Community Goal Setting for a Special Area of the City with Recommendations and Options for Land Use Amendments,” was prepared for the City of Port Orford with a grant from the Oregon Department of Land Conservation and Development.

The process was called “Community Visioning.” The people spoke, we found common ground, and it was decided that Port Orford wanted to maintain a small town atmosphere and preserve its natural beauty. The process was carefully articulated, is masterfully documented,

and beautifully illustrated in a manual that has been available to all who are interested since **July of 2006**. It is called “Looking to the Future.”

Last week at the Planning Commission meeting, all forward movement came to a halt when a small group of merchants and property owners voiced their opposition to the project. Some of the people who are now protesting the loudest and obstructing progress were present at the planning meetings and had ample opportunity to voice concerns --- but said nothing.

My question is this -- Why wait until the train is almost at the station before derailing it? What is the motivation behind this 11th hour protest? Qui Bono?

Certainly not the community that worked diligently to reach consensus on their vision. Certainly not little Port Orford.

--On Monday, June 25th a special meeting of the Port Orford City Council is

scheduled at 7 PM, for open discussion on these issues. Whatever your position is, if you care -- show up, sign up and speak up.

Responding to Shirley Nelson's comments on Measure 37

Shirley, your letter on Measure 37 soundly proves my point: One man's fox in the chicken house, is another man's right to use his property as he sees fit.

Landowners that have lost the value of their property – due to regulations imposed by the county and state, deserve to be compensated or given the opportunity to use their property as they would have. Oregon's voters have twice made this clear. Measure 37 claimants have owned their property for many decades, and are only asking for the right to utilize their property as they would have prior to implementation of SB100 (1973) which created the LCDC.

Put yourself in the place of Curry County property owners, whom have considered their property as an investment for retirement, or as a future home for members of

their family. Regulations have taken that opportunity from them.

The dollar figure you mention is not a figure which any state or local government is obligated to pay; under Measure 37 the regulators need only permit the property to be used as was allowed prior to 1973 to avoid any financial burden.

How can you call that greed? I ask you again; put yourself in their place. Property rights are a fundamental right. Even those seven lumber companies you referenced have a right to see a return on their investment. (We do all live in stick-built houses)


