## Cranberry Harvest

Southern Coos and Northern Curry County are home to approximately 3,125 acres of cranberry bogs. There are a total of 3,145 acres in the state with about 20 acres located near Astoria. Fall is the time of the year for the cranberry harvest and it is almost complete.

There are 55,209 acres of cranberry bogs worldwide. Wisconsin with 18,983 acres and Massachusetts with 15,353 acres lead the United States in acreage with New Jersey following with 3,664 acres and then Oregon with 3,145 acres. Chile has 1,190 acres of cranberry bogs. British Columbia has 5,856 acres and Eastern Canada has 4,832 acres of cranberry bogs.

Worldwide there are 30,498 acres in production contracted out to Ocean Spray Cooperative. 24,711 acres are what is known as in production by independents growers. In Oregon the number of acres in production by independent growers outnumbers Ocean Spray growers by a 2-1 margin with 1,038 acres of cranberries going to Ocean Spray and 2,107 going to independent processors. Ocean Spray is a grower owned cooperative with a large processing plant on Highway 101 in Bandon. The Ocean Spray

brand is the most well known one but many other companies are producing and selling cranberry products including Tropicana, Langers, R.W. Knudsen and they are also sold under store brands like Western Family and Kirkland. The products range from cranberry juice including a wide variety of combinations from cranberry-apple to cranberry grape, cranberry tea, cranberry sauce, craisins and cranberry capsules. Oregon cranberries are prized for their higher sugar content than berries from other states according to grower Daryl Robison.

Locally the largest number of cranberry bogs is located on Airport Road or off of Airport Road to the north and south. The largest cranberry farm is Sea Wind with 165 acres. Most cranberry farms are family owned and run and average far fewer acres. There are approximately 150 cranberry farms in the two county area with the average size being 15 acres. The smallest cranberry farm is owned by David and Mary Margaret Smith who own a one acre bog. They raise their cranberries organically and dry harvest them. Howard and Jerri Walters own and run Brush Prairie Bogs and are also organic. They get more money for their berries by being organic and selling them themselves and promoting

their cranberries with an excellent web site.

The vast majority of cranberries are wet harvested by flooding the bogs. The growers flood the bogs causing the cranberries to float though still attached to the vines. Then a specially designed harvesting machine separates the berries from the vines and they float to the surface of the water. The cranberries are then corralled into a section of the bog and a specially designed elevator is used to load them onto the trucks you see driving up and down Highway 101.

Prices for cranberries fluctuate from year to year. Demand for cranberry products has been rising and this year the independent growers are being paid 65 cents per pound. Healthy well maintained cranberry bogs can produce up to 22,000 pounds of berries per year which would bring in \$14,300 per acre. Cranberries are "measured" in terms of barrels with a barrel of cranberries weighing 100 pounds. The average yield per acre is 175 barrels or 17,500 pounds. There are some new varieties that can produce up to 400 barrels per acre. This year's Oregon cranberry crop in Curry and Coos Counties is estimated to be worth between 29-30 million dollars

to the growers. Cranberries are a boom to the local economy where most other natural resource revenue producing industries like timber harvesting and fishing are in decline or threatened.

There was an article in the Saturday, November 3 Register-Guard titled "record blueberry crop expected." The article stated that the statewide Oregon blueberry crop would come in at 35.6 million pounds harvested and was worth \$53.1 million to the growers. The article says there were 4,400 acres of blueberries in 2006 with many more acres being added each year. Blueberries and cranberries are good news for Oregon farmers. And what would Thanksgiving dinner be without cranberries on the table?

### CCEC in Good Shape

The Board of Directors of Coos Curry Electric Co-op met on Friday, October 26 in their regularly scheduled monthly meeting.

Roger Meader, General Manager/CEO reviewed the financial reports with the Board and in follow-up meetings with employees. "We're in good shape financially," Roger told employees. He went on to say that we have fewer new services than last year which may be indicative of the slowdown of the economy on the southern Oregon coast. New services to date are 144, compared to 220 last year. "The Bandon area, however, is a little ahead of last year," Roger explained. "The golf course is getting ready to expand and new homes are also in the works in that area."

The Board heard a presentation by ACRT and Arbor Intelligence (AI) LLC, firms hired to do a study on the cooperative's tree trimming practices. "We spend a lot of money on tree trimming and the Board wanted to be sure our practices were appropriate and we were using that money in the most cost effective way," Roger told employees. Electric utilities nationally are analyzing all recurring annual maintenance and operation expense, which include line clearance operations because they typically are

the single largest maintenance expense and have a significant impact on system reliability.

The Board selected Blodgett, Mickelsen & Naef, P.S., Certified Public Accountants, an auditing firm located in Kennewick, Washington, to provide auditing services in 2008. "Cooperatives are advised to hire new auditing firms every three to five years," Roger told employees. "Changing auditors that often is common practice."


While no action was taken, the Board conducted an extensive review of the 2008 proposed budget developed by staff and presented by Roger. "The proposed budget and 10-year financial forecast that the Board is considering has no rate increase until 2010, but that all really depends on the cost of power and snow pack."

### Planning Commission Meets

The Port Orford Planning Commission meets on Tuesday, November 13, 7:00pm, in the city hall council chambers.

## Free Chautauqua Program

Is it possible to read a house like a book, gleaning meaning and insight from its architecture and personality? Does the way that we site and build our homes speak to cultural and social values? The Port Orford and Langlois Libraries are pleased to host an Oregon Chautauqua program from the Oregon Council for the Humanities at which Diana Coogle will discuss how the ways we create our home spaces may reveal more than just aesthetic choices in "Reading Houses: What Architecture Tells Us about Ourselves." This free, public program will take place on Saturday, November 10,

2007, at 2:00pm at the Port Orford Council Chambers.

Coogle, who built her own cabin with a handsaw and hammer, explores these questions through built homes and those imagined in the worlds of art and literature. Her illustrations include homes that embody their builder's philosophy, from the scientific innovations of Thomas Jefferson's Monticello to Frank Lloyd Wright's precept that, "a house should be of the hill, belonging to it, so hill and house could live together each the happier for the other." Literary excerpts from Kenneth Graham, James Joyce, and Emily Bronte add to the picture, as

do examples from Oregon communities that reflect social values and perspectives. Audiences will gain a new appreciation for reading their own homes in this multi-disciplinary program.

Ms. Coogle is an author, teacher, theater director, community volunteer, and a regular commentator on Jefferson Public Radio.





### **Superintendent's Column** **By Ruby Price**

On October 31, Halloween, you could have heard a pin drop in the gymnasium of Pacific High School during a powerful assembly, "Drugs, Alcohol, and the Law".

Mr. Ken Dukay, Director of Curry County Juvenile Department delivered a sobering and thoughtful message to the students. He described the history of MLDA (minimum legal drinking age), the serious legal consequences of drinking and driving, and the legal ramifications.

Mr. Dukay challenged the attentive students by saying, "Please don't drink and drive! And if you do make a mistake and drink, call your parents. Whatever con-

sequence they are going to give you is much less than a DUI, a MIP. You are probably going to be grounded, but you and your friends will be alive!"

Chief Creighton followed this powerful message by delivering a challenge to the students to make sound decisions when you are driving. "I'm the one who has to tell parents tragic news about their children." The chief reinforced his message by giving each student a pamphlet "Driving: Through the Eyes of Teens."

Gayle Wilcox, Fire Chief, eloquently ended the assembly with descriptions of responding to accidents, the trauma caused by careless driving, the indescribable anguish of families who have lost their children in auto fatalities, and the fact that this community has had more than its share of accidents recently. "We are asking you to help us out," she pleaded with the kids; "If you should not be driving, don't drive. Keep an eye on each other!"
