Police Reserves Honored By Evan Kramer

The Port Orford City Council may have two mayors but neither was present at last Thursday night's meeting. Serving as acting mayor in their absence was council president John Hewitt.

Hewitt read a letter from Mayor Jim Auburn thanking the police reserves for all the work they do on behalf of the city. Part of the letter reads as follows: "We would like to specifically thank Reserve Sergeant Derwin Boggs, and Reserve Office Corporal Tyson Breuer for their diligent and painstaking efforts to solve a local burglary case. This demonstrates excellent police work, and is a credit to the profession. Sgt. Boggs and Corporal Breuer also have sufficient training to be able to work on their own, and handle patrol shifts, and emergency response. Thank you Sgt. Boggs and Corporal Breuer!"

Police Department Clerk Patty Barnes read a statement to the council about Resolution 2009-11 (Setting policy for law enforcement) which was on the council agenda for later in the meeting. She advocated making the wording more modern than using Sir Robert Peel's wording for Principles of Policing which was written in 1829. She

said the policy should be simplified and made more coherent with language in everyday terms. (From Sir Robert Peel's name, police came to be known as "Bobbies" in England and "Peelers" in Ireland.)

Jack Marohl spoke to the council concerned about the \$7,000 they had spent on the police department seminar earlier this year. He also asked if we were going to get a new mayor. Marohl is concerned that the current situation with the police department or police-mess as he calls it could have an effect on his property insurance.

Jim Wills Jr. said the council had been voted in by a two thirds majority and thought they were doing a wonderful job. He said he supported the city council and didn't feel like he had been disenfranchised.

Council president Hewitt asked City Administrator Mike Murphy if the city had applied for any of the federal stimulus money. Murphy replied that he had submitted an application for stimulus dollars to the Oregon Department of Transportation in the amount of \$576,000 for "pavement overlays and culvert repairs." Murphy also applied for 3.87 million dollars from the Department of Environmental Quality for

improvements to the sewer system. He stated in his written report to the council that he was not overly optimistic about getting these monies.

Public Works Director Allan Wagner told the council his crew was doing a nice job and they were making steady improvements in the department. The water loss rate for February was 60%. Wagner reported some of the service mains have having been in service since 1937. Councilor Caroline Clancy reported the public works department found a water leak at her house and fixed it leading to much better water pressure. She was very appreciative.

Councilor Scott Luhr reported that the Port of Port Orford Commission of which he is the chairman voted unanimously to support both the Oregon Main Street Program and the City of Port Orford Police Levy. Council Bill McArdle, council liaison to the watershed council, and streets, reported on possible hiking trail through town that paralleled the wetlands.

Mike Murphy spoke about a nuisance complaint directed against a local business with excess vehicles. John Hewitt said he would like to see the code enforcement officer contact the business

first and give the property owner a chance to clean up the property before issuing an abatement notice. This subject will become a "continuing action item" on the council agenda until it is resolved.

The council approved Resolution 2009-10 (approving the annual adjustment for inflation to the water and wastewater systems development charges. The rate of change approved is 4.31835% based on the inflation rate.

Councilor Luhr offered a motion to accept the rewritten City Administrator's Job Description. One change in the job description is that as approved the administrator has general supervision over all city employees including the police department and chief but may not employ or fire a department head without the concurrence of the Mayor and city council. The motion carried unanimously.

The council approved a motion by Scott Luhr for the city to apply for a grant ap-

plication for booster and child seats for cars. These car seats and boosters will be distributed to anyone who requests them though the emphasis was on low income families.

The Council got back to Resolution 2009-11 setting policy for law enforcement. It's too long a document to print in this paper but the council wanted people to get a copy and read it and make suggestions. You can get a copy at the Fun Zone or at Port Orford City Hall. The council will look into rewriting it more clearly and with use of the current vernacular. The Resolution specifically is worded as "Setting Policy for Law Enforcement" yet the council couldn't quite decide if it was a policy statement or a mission statement for community policing. Councilor Luhr said he wanted more community input on the Resolution.

Mike Murphy announced that on June 19 and June 20 the city would be holding a hazardous waste clean up. It is tentatively set to be held on Idaho Street between Eighteenth and Nineteenth Streets. June 19 will be the day for

small businesses to bring their hazardous wastes in for small fee and June 20 the day for households to bring theirs in for free. All costs for the hazardous waste drop will be paid for by State of Oregon which will have DEQ employees on hand to sort the materials. Murphy emphasized that all hazardous type materials may be turned in from paints to old gasoline and insecticides. Since they rarely hold this type of event in Port Orford it would be wise to mark in on your calendar and take advantage of it. Remember no charge for homeowners and the city is looking for volunteers to help out.

Whale Watching Spoken Here

This week is Whale Watch Week along the 362 miles of the Oregon Coast. The annual migration of Gray Whales is occurring as they return to their summer feeding grounds in the Bering Sea. The gray whales are being counted as they go past various whale watch stations including the one at Battle Rock Park. They are returning north on their 10,000 mile migration from their winter in Baja California.

Power Outlook Dismal

The Coos-Curry Electric Cooperative, Inc. (CCEC) board of directors continued discussions about future power supply including pending legislative initiatives and the Bonneville Power Administration’s (BPA) rate increase expected for later this year at their March 19 meeting. “The BPA is dealing with the same issues as PNGC Power, including lost revenue from market sales and generation,” General Manager/CEO Roger Meader said. BPA’s projected rate increase, which was originally announced as between eight and 15 percent, is now upwards of 20 percent. Future wholesale power costs remain “dismal” according to Meader.

“We know our members are struggling and the looming electric price increases won’t help,” Meader continued. “But we are working every angle to control costs.” For example, a team of employees recently completed a comprehensive review of the cooperative’s procedures and costs incurred for materials and services with a goal of evaluating what the cooperative is currently spending and making constructive recommenda-

tions which could improve cash flow by reducing costs. Recommendations are now being considered by the cooperative’s management and several are in various stages of implementation.

In addition, Christine Stallard, the cooperative’s Marketing and Member Services Manager told the board of directors that approximately 700 CCEC members had saved over \$12,000 since mid-January using the Co-op Connections® discount cards at local pharmacies. This represents nearly a 35 percent savings on prescription drugs. Stallard told the board of directors that Touchstone Energy® predicts that two percent of a cooperative’s members typically use the discount card; however, she had recently been notified that over 3.5% of CCEC’s members are using the cards. “Nation-wide, only one other Touchstone Energy cooperative involved in the Co-op Connections program has a higher percentage of members using the discount cards,” Stallard said. “With the economy the way it is and the bleak news about rising electricity costs, the Co-op Connections cards are obviously providing needed benefit for our mem-

bers.” Touchstone Energy expects to add vision, hearing and dental discount programs in the near future. The Co-op Connections program offers a wide variety of discounts to members – from rental cars to food – locally and nationwide. Local merchants interested in becoming Co-op Connections participants may call any CCEC office for details.

The board of directors adopted a meter tampering and unauthorized diversion of electric energy policy which requires the cooperative to bill and collect usage not recorded on the meter after theft of service or tampering is discovered. In addition, a meter tampering fee of \$250, the cost of repairs and all other associated expenses the cooperative has incurred will be charged. Next month, the board expects to finalize and pass a comprehensive member services policy which will establish a \$3 processing fee for past-due bills and reduce the existing \$100 connect charges. These and other topics will be discussed at the upcoming Town Hall meeting, scheduled for April 2nd at the CCEC office in Port Orford at 7:00pm.

The second in the series of Children's Art Classes will be held in the 'Freedom of Speech Room' at the Port Orford Library April 4th. The Port Orford Arts Council has enlisted many talented local artists to guide children in the development of their imagination and creativity through art. Classes are held for elementary students on the 1st and 3rd Saturday every month from 10 a.m. until noon. Children under 6 must have an adult accompany them.

April 4th, artist Kelly Fleming will teach her students the art of felting. Students may select their favorite color of downy clouds of wool. Then using warm water with soap will change through controlled shrinkage, the billowy orb of wool into either a felt ball

(maybe for a kitty toy), or a square of felt they can display in their room. It may be fun for mom and dad to select an area for students to display their art accomplishments over the weeks and months ahead.

April 18th Kelly Fleming will teach 'Critter Beading'. Students will learn the art of laddering, which is used to bead a favorite bug, animal, or perhaps bead a bracelet. Small colored glass beads and waxed thread are used in laddering. Once students learn the technique it may become a favorite at home hobby or a means for children to make gifts for family and friends.

Twice a month children are able to spend 2 fun filled hours as they explore the world of art. After class, the children can browse and check out books from the thousands of children's books avail-

able at the library. And, they can select a movie or DVD to take home and watch. What a great way to spend a Saturday.

Health Center Ribbon Cutting!


The community is invited to the grand opening of the School Based Health Center at Pacific High School, 12:15pm on Tuesday, April 7.

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Wilderness Lands

Seven public lands bills authored by U.S. Senator Ron Wyden (D-Ore.) passed the Senate again on March 19 by a vote of 77 to 20, as part of the Omnibus Public Land Management Act of 2009 (H.R. 146): "The Lewis and Clark Mount Hood Wilderness Act of 2007," "The Copper Salmon Wilderness Act," "The Oregon Badlands Wilderness Act of 2008," "The Cascade Siskiyou National Monument Voluntary and Equitable Grazing Conflict Resolution Act," "The Spring Basin Wilderness Act of 2008," "The Fisheries Restoration and Irrigation Mitigation Act of 2008" and "The Watershed Restoration and Enhancement Agreements Act of 2007." The Omnibus bill had passed the Senate in mid-January but failed to reach the 2/3 majority vote in the House of Representatives required to pass it under suspension of the rules. The bill will now move to the House for final passage.

"I hope the second time is the charm for this lands package, because in good economic times and bad, appreciating the outdoors isn't just a passion in Oregon, it's a way of life and a 5.8 billion dollar economic engine for the state," said Senator Wyden.

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2009 Ocean Salmon Season

The Pacific Fishery Management Council will host a public hearing at 7:00pm on March 30 at the Red Lion Hotel in Coos Bay to review options for the upcoming ocean salmon season off the Oregon coast.

In meetings last week, the PFMC announced the strongest hatchery Coho abundance forecast since 2001, raising prospects of a banner year for sport fishermen along the coast.

A total of 1.3 million adult Coho are forecast for the Oregon coast and Columbia River this year, up from 290,000 forecasted in 2008.

Bye Bye Birdie

Secretary of the Interior Ken Salazar has released the first ever comprehensive report on bird populations in the United States, (see www.stateofthebirds.org) showing that nearly a third of the nation's 800 bird species are endangered, threatened or in significant decline due to habitat loss, invasive species, and other threats.

At the same time, the report highlights examples, including many species of waterfowl, where habitat restoration and conservation have reversed previous declines, offering hope that it is not too late to take action to save declining populations.

The report, *The U.S. State of the Birds*, synthesizes data from three long-running bird censuses conducted by thousands of citizen scientists and professional biologists. In particular, it calls attention to the crisis in Hawaii, where more birds are in danger of extinction

than anywhere else in the United States. In addition, the report indicates a 40 percent decline in grassland birds over the past 40 years, a 30 percent decline in

birds of aridlands, and high concern for many coastal shorebirds. Furthermore, 39 percent of species dependent on U.S. oceans have declined.
