Port Projects Support Grows By Evan Kramer

Support for the Port Orford Marine Economic Recovery Plan continues to grow in Port Orford. The Port of Port Orford Commission met on Friday morning in special session and voted in favor of a Resolution to move forward through the Oregon Way program for the stimulus money for the Port projects. On Monday afternoon the North Curry County and Port Orford Chamber of Commerce voted unanimously in favor of a Declaration of Cooperation in support of the Port Orford Economic Development Project or as it is known in full, "Sustainable Fisheries, Sustainable Ports: The Port Orford Marine Economic Recovery Plan". The Chamber support means they will assume responsibility for the following: supporting the public process to inform citizens of efforts to resolve the shoaling issues, supporting the establishment of the Port Orford Ocean Resources Team research station and supporting a walking trail from Battle Rock Park to the Port. The Port Orford City Council approved a similar Declaration of Support for the project at their June 4 meeting.

Curry County Economic Development Department director Susan Brown shared a 44 page document her depart-

ment prepared which was used as part of the case the Port Orford Ocean Resources Team (POORT) made to the Oregon Way committee meeting. The report listed many areas which would be affected by this over \$10.72 million project. This project is described as "an innovative project to make Port Orford a center for sustainable fisheries and a showcase on the South Coast for both Oregon's first marine preserve and for green technologies that enhance the local economy and create jobs."

Estimated job creation for the various buildings is 225 construction related jobs of which 144 will be in the direct field of construction including engineers, contractors, plumbers, electricians, etc. The study indicates an average annual salary for these jobs at \$44,000 a year. There would be an estimated 27 jobs created indirectly related to suppliers providing construction material. The estimated "long term job retention" would be 117 jobs, most of them in the fishing industry.

The estimated total cost for the project is \$10,720,226.47 of which \$9,872,323.00 is the amount requested from the federal government via the stimulus program. Current estimated costs for the new cannery (fisheries) building are \$3,134,373.73 and \$475,115.00 for the

field station and wet lab. Cost for the Pacific Building to house the offices and restaurant is \$2,522,823.70 while the Marine Interpretive Center building is estimated at \$1,489,515.91 with the interpretive center exhibits costing \$745,500.00. The new restroom/freezer building is estimated to cost \$806,074.13. The existing cannery building, restrooms and the building now housing Griff's will be razed to make room for the new buildings.

The difference between the federal grant and the actual cost of the projects will be made up by private investments from Griff's Restaurant and Nor-Cal Seafoods, POORT ongoing grants and Port of Port Orford owned land and infrastructure.

The project consists of several buildings including replacement of the old wooden cannery building at the Port with a new state of the art 14,500 square foot building which would house Norcal Fisheries and include space for a wet lab for POORT. A second building known as the Pacific Building would replace the current Port office with a new two story building housing the Port office, Griff's Restaurant, a marine field station lab and the POORT office. Another part of the project is a Marine Interpretive

Center at Battle Rock Park built at the site of the visitor center/bathrooms. The current building would be demolished and a new two story building built to replace it with the Interpretive Center on the second floor and a new visitor center and bathrooms on the first floor. The footprint of the building would not be enlarged.

Our Port Orford project was only the second one approved by the Oregon Way Advisory Committee and the only one that was approved on May 28 at the meeting in Portland. We went to the head of the line because other fishing communities didn't participate in this process and because of the proposed Red Fish Marine Reserve which has been supported by our local fishing community... The project's approval by the Oregon Way Advisory Committee means the project goes to Governor Kulongoski's office for his signature and then the governor's staff will assist with

getting the project approved for federal stimulus dollars.

The main thing to remember is this is not a done deal. The case will have to be made to the federal government and made well, but there are thousands of projects all over the United States competing for the \$786 billion dollars in stimulus money. President Obama wants many of the projects started this summer but it's hard to believe Port Orford's projects could be started that soon.

As I reflect over the last three years and my time as superintendent of the Port Orford-Langlois School District, I want to thank this community for your exceptional commitment to this community's children. Together we created a vision of what we wanted the Port Orford-Langlois School District to become, always keeping student achievement as a top priority. Highlights of our work to ensure success included:

- the aligning of the district's human and financial resources to support district's achievement and instructional goals
- the creation of a safe and orderly climate where students could learn and teachers could teach
- the forming of collaborative relationships with teachers, staff members, parents and other members in our community to solve common problems and support common successes
- the focusing of attention on continuous improvement by questioning, examining, revising, refining and revisiting issues related to student achievement

We established a Key Communicator Network, which created a vehicle

to communicate immediately with staff, parents, and key communicators throughout the district via e-mail in times of crisis, vastly reducing the incidences of mis-information and unfounded rumors.

Key Communicators continue to be an integral part of the communications system in the greater Port Orford-Langlois school community.
