Port Orford is a busy hub of activity as the first day of summer approaches on Sunday (Happy Father's Day!)

On Monday morning the 2009 dredging at the Port of Port Orford got underway with the arrival of the clamshell barge, sand barge and two tug boats. American Construction out of Tacoma, Washington got the contract from the Army Corps of Engineers to do the clamshell dredging of the Port this year. The company is expected to remove 30,000-40,000 cubic yards of sand from the Port harbor before leaving town next week according to Port Manager Gary Anderson. They will be here 7 to 10 days. American Construction brought in the "Patriot" which houses the clamshell dredge with a 20 cubic yard bucket, the Lummi Island barge which is the vessel used to transport the sand out to the disposal site, a large tug to pull the Lummi Island in and out of the Port plus a smaller tug for running smaller jobs. The sand disposal site is approximately big enough to handle 45,000 cubic yards of material. The goal of the dredge work is to get the harbor area dredged to a mean low water depth of 16.2 feet.

Over at Driftwood School remodeling work has begun to prepare the school for the new school year when all K-8 students in the District will attend Driftwood. Local contractor Young Construction got the job to remodel what was called the playshed into the school's gymnasium. Not only are they a local contractor but the load of wood they had outside the gym was from Western Builders which was heartening. Improvements to the playshed/gym include framing up the inside of the building, insulation, and plywood walls, a wooden floor which will cover up the cement floor, backboards for playing basketball, and on the outside of the building facing Eleventh Street a room for lockers and storage. Other projects planned for this summer at Driftwood include equipping a new computer lab, and major improvements by the Port Orford Rotary Club to the athletic field and playground. Also the glass block windows facing west towards Highway 101 will be removed and be replaced by new more energy efficient windows. The school district's insurance inspector report stated that a strong wind or earthquake could cause the glass block windows to collapse. They are also not as energy efficient as the windows that will be installed. The school will also get a new heating and cooling system so say

goodbye to the old chimney as it comes down this summer.

School Superintendent Mick Lane has put out a call for volunteers to help paint the interior hallways of the school as well as the classrooms and help with landscaping the school grounds. Items that are needed for these projects include cash donations, equipment, materials, and plants. You can call Mick to volunteer at the District office at 348-2337 or e-mail him at mlane@2cj.com. Some of the interior painting began this week but the majority will take place after July 4 so plenty of time to volunteer.

Demolition began at Battle Rock Park on the Shell Shack building at 8:00am on Tuesday morning. Once it is torn down and the ruins trucked away the Wheelhouse Restaurant building gets torn down and by the time you read this both buildings will probably be memories only. The Wheelhouse is a 1970's era block construction building that at one time housed the Wheelhouse Restaurant, Ice Cream Shop and real estate office with the last business in the building being Java John's which closed a month ago. The Wheelhouse building will make way for a sculpture garden adjacent to the Hawthorne Family gal-

lery which will be located in the former Coast Candle/Orford's Building.

Watching the Shell Shack get smashed to pieces and hauled away reminded me of all the times Valerie and I went in there starting when we moved here in 1990. Bob and Betty Tope owned the Shell Shack then and it was a great little gift shop and a place we regularly visited especially at Christmas time. The Topes left town for a warmer climate sometime in the 90's and sold it to Dale and Paul Dearing. Paula continued in the Tope's tradition of running an excellent gift shop. People tell me that before the Topes had the building as a gift shop it was a fish and chips restaurant named Molly Malone's owned by Gladys Ponting and her son Jack Ponting. He said he and his mother Gladys ran it as Molly Malone's from 1970-1976 but did not own the building. 33 years later people still talk about the fish and chips at Molly Malone's. The Shell Shack site will make way for the Hawthorne owned Red Fish Restaurant.

The Wheelhouse Restaurant was owned and run by George and Delaine Kennedy in 1990 around 1991 they sold it to John and Jackie Ineson. The building was owned by Bob Sutton and The Wheelhouse was a fixture on the Port Orford breakfast circuit.

July 4 Fireworks

New state and federal safety rules and regulations combined with a high tide on the 4th of July make it necessary to place the following restrictions into motion.

1. The beach at Hubbard Creek up to Battle Rock Beach will be CLOSED to all vehicle traffic for the entire day. The only exception will be vehicles necessary for the dinghy races.
2. The beach from Battle Rock south to the big rock (known locally as Cabbage Rock) in the middle of the beach, marked with barricade tape, will be completely CLOSED to the public at 3 pm on July 4. This area will remain off limits to all foot traffic until after the fireworks display. Do not attempt to enter this area until the Fire Dept. has vacated the beach.
3. NO personal fireworks will be permitted on the beach.

These restrictions will be strictly enforced to ensure the safety of the public and Fire Dept. personnel and to comply with state and federal laws. Your understanding and cooperation is greatly

appreciated. Let’s all have a safe and happy 4th of July.

“Pay it Forward” By Elaine Roemen

Most of us don't face the subject of organ donation unless we or a loved one have a failing vital organ and will die if it isn't replaced by a healthy one. Jim Auburn, has a new lease on life due to a kidney from a young woman who had the foresight to register as a donor when she got her driver's license. Jim gave a talk to Rotarians to impress on people the importance of registering as a donor. The easiest way to register as a potential donor is to put it on your driver's license, or you can go online to www.donatelifenw.org.

For a transplant to take place the deceased donor must die in the hospital and have a compatible organ; the recipient must be available to receive it in a few hours. To be a transplant candidate there is extensive physical, medical, and psychological testing required. Nationally there are 100,000 patients waiting

for organ transplants, 85,000 for kidneys. In 2006 there were only 16,500 kidney transplants, a similar number of patients die waiting. Several friends and relatives offered to be donors for Jim, (you can live with one kidney)) but only his youngest son was eligible and was going through tests when Jim's donor kidney was made available.

Jim was in the end stages of a chronic autoimmune disease, which had been kept in remission since 1995. In April of this year when Karen and Jim were driving home from a medical appointment in Portland they received a call that there was a kidney for Jim. They turned around and Jim was in surgery at Legacy Good Samaritan Hospital within a few hours. His new kidney started functioning almost immediately and he was discharged after a week in ICU with \$16500 in drugs and feeling better than he had for years. The costs were cov-

ered by Medicare and Tricare, (Jim was a Captain in the Navy.)

As a consequence of this life giving experience Jim has become highly informed about “state of the art” transplant hospitals in Portland, the high percentage of Oregon donors compared to the rest of the country, the ins and outs of medical coverage for hospital procedures and medications.

Jim has his cell phone programmed to buzz him for the many anti rejection meds he takes and he is enjoying eating good food that was previously restricted. He thanked the Lord, his friends and family who have been praying for him, his doctors and the fellow “transplantees” he bonded with in the hospital but especially his beloved Karen who has been taking excellent care of him.

A fond farewell to Rotarian Ruby Price and her husband Dale who will be moving to Creswell this week.

Port Orford Tagging Study:

The Port Orford live-fish fishery has become one of the more economically important fisheries over the past ten years. The Port Orford fleet alone holds over half of the nearshore permits in Oregon. Even with this dramatic increase in harvest, little has been done to increase our knowledge of the ecology and sustainability of nearshore fish. This summer we will continue tagging the nearshore species harvested here. Of particular interest is the Sebastes complex, also known as rockfishes.

Rockfish species are unique in that they have a swim bladder, an internal buoyancy device that allows fish to adjust their depth. When fish are caught they are rapidly brought to the surface, not allowing the fish adequate time to equalize, causing rapid bladder expansion known as baurotrauma. Fish suffering from extreme baurotrauma have external symptoms like bulging eyes, pushed out esophagus, and bloating. Some fishermen practice "venting" fish with a hypodermic needle, puncturing the bladder and releasing the pressure. Here in Port Orford, a voluntary conservation measure has been established that asks fishermen to "vent" and release the spawning female rockfish. This practice can contribute to productivity and sustainability of the nearshore fishery by allowing those large females to continue to repopulate. What is not known is

how these female fish react to "venting" practices. This study will investigate the potential survival of these big, old, fertile, fat, female fish (endearingly called BOFFFFs). By tagging these spawning fish, it will be possible to look at effectiveness of different venting methods, as well as the timing of larval release and distribution of pregnant female rockfish in nearshore habitats. This year we will be tagging black, china, and quillback rockfish. This collaborative study is part of a greater effort between Oregon State University, Oregon SeaGrant, and Port Orford Ocean Resource Team (POORT). If you encounter a tagged fish, please snip, record, and save! Collect the location (preferably latitude/longitude), depth and date of capture, and species the tag was taken from. Please write down the color and number of the tag. You may keep or release the fish, according to ODFW regulations. Please return all tags to the POORT office at (541) 332-0627 and receive a free "Tag Recovery Team" cap and \$10 gift-card to Englund Marine. You will also be registered for the grand prize drawing at the close of the study. We appreciate your help!

Fire Season Begins

According to Coos Forest Protective Association, fire season will officially begin at 1:00am Friday, June 19. The start of fire season activates restrictions on public and industrial forest use on all private, county, state and Bureau of Land Management.

The start of fire season means the end of unregulated outside burning for rural Coos, Curry and western Douglas County residents. Written permits and on-site inspections will be required for all types of outside burning, including debris burning and the use of burn bar-

rels. Permits are free of charge and may be obtained as follows.

Residents living in rural areas can call their local CFPA office during normal business hours, seven days a week, at one of the following numbers: Coos Bay, 267-3161; Gold Beach, 247-6241; and Fourmile, 347-3400. A Fire Warden will come to the burn site to perform the inspection and write the permit.

County residents within an incorporated city should call their local fire department for restrictions and permit details.

Industrial fire regulations will also go into effect. Industrial Fire Precaution

Level (IFPL) 1 prohibits smoking while working on or traveling through an industrial operation. Specified fire tools and suppression equipment must be maintained at all operations. A fire watch is also required at all industrial operation sites unless waived or modified in writing by a Fire Warden.

As fire season progresses, additional closures and restrictions may be imposed as weather conditions become more severe.
