Election News

The May 18 Gubernatorial Primary Election means that the filing deadline is nearing to get your name on the ballot. Candidates for office have to file with the Curry County or State Elections offices no later than March 9. This year there is one county commission position up for election and it is currently held by Georgia Nowlin. She has written a letter to the public via the newspapers and we have it here below in full. Nowlin is in the fourth year of her term office. The voters decided in a previous election to make the position of county commissioner non-partisan. All candidates will run together with the top two vote getters in a runoff in November unless one candidate receives 50% of the vote plus one and is thus elected. Other offices up for election include that of Oregon State Representative. This position is held by Wayne Krieger who has already announced he will run for another term.

The reason they call it the Gubernatorial Primary Election is Oregon will be electing a new governor to replace Ted Kulongoski in November. He is in his eighth year in office and is term limited out. Democrats and former Governor John Kitzhaber and former Secretary of State Bill Bradbury are running for

their party's nomination along with Roger Obrist and Steve Shields. All but Kitzhaber have filed with the Oregon Secretary of State's office. In the Republican primary Allen Alley, John Lim and Bill Sizemore have filed to run in their party's primary. The non partisan office of State Superintendent of Public Instruction is up for election this year with incumbent Susan Castillo the only person to file as of January 18. Positions four and five on the Oregon Supreme Court are up for election. Quick – how many people can name one member of the Oregon Supreme Court? I can't name one.

Congressman Peter DeFazio, now in his twelfth term in office, will seek reelection this year in the November election and has had a pretty easy time of it recently with the Republican Party failing to offer a candidate to run against him in the 2008 election.

This is an election year for the Port Orford City Council as well with three council positions and the mayor's position up for election. Councilors Caroline Clancy, Tim Pogwizd and John Hewitt are in seats that are up for election as is Mayor Jim Auburn. City voters will decide these races in the November balloting. Clancy and Pogwizd were elected in 2008 to two year terms of of-

ice and whoever wins those seats this year will be elected to a four year term. Mayor Auburn was appointed Mayor last year and the position has to be on the ballot this year for a four year term.

Ballots for the January 26 special election are due back no later than 8:00pm that night and may either be mailed in or put in the elections drop box at City Hall.

The following is a letter to the editor from County Commissioner Georgia Nowlin.

“March 9th 2010 is the deadline to file as a candidate for Curry County Commissioner.

I will not be seeking re-election this year for that position..

Although there are many good reasons to continue to serve, there are just as many good reasons to not run again. After much thought, I have chosen not to run again.

The truth is, I came into office with the intention of serving only one term. However, I quickly realized that the county had major challenges in the near future. So, at one point, I thought that staying in office for another term would

Police Chief Report By Marvin Combs

The Port Orford Police Department, along with other Law Enforcement agencies, will be watching the usage of cell phones while driving a motor vehicle. As you may not be aware, it is now illegal to talk (unless using a “hands free” device) or text and driving your car on the roadways of Oregon. In the event you receive a call or text while driving, you should pull over to the side of the road to respond. Over the last week, officers have seen some people doing the right thing and others still driving and talking. Effective immediately, we will be stopping you for this violation. It is our hope folks will comply with this new law and no citations will have to be issued. I know that some of you do not agree with this law, unfortunately it is now in effect, so let’s all get on board and follow the law to keep our highways safe.

During this last week the Port Orford Police Department arrested Rick Thomas Phillips on multiple warrants out of Curry County. Phillips was lodged in the Curry County Jail with bail set at

\$225,000 dollars. He was charged with the following crimes.

- Burglary in the First Degree
 - Burglary in the Second Degree
 - Theft in the First Degree
 - Unauthorized use of a Vehicle
 - Criminal Mischief in the First Degree
 - Unlawful Possession of Methamphetamine
- Further, in follow-up to a case involving Adam Sullivan in November, 2009, in which Mr. Sullivan was charged with Burglary, that charge has now been dismissed by the Curry County District Attorney’s Office.

The Port Orford Police Department has received several calls referencing the stealing of gasoline from vehicles. This is occurring all over Port Orford we recommend that you buy locking gas caps and place them on your cars. We are working with the public on the theft of gasoline, if you have any information who is committing the crime please give us a call or call the non emergency line at the Curry County Dispatch center.

Bill Binnewies will speak to the Friends of Cape Blanco at their annual meeting. He is president of Shoreline Education for Awareness. The meeting begins at 10:00am in the Freedom of Speech Room of Port Orford Library, Thursday, January 21. All members in attendance will hear program reports on the record breaking gains in 2009, vote for new Board members, and adopt a budget for 2010. Refreshments will be served.

Shoreline Education for Awareness is a local nonprofit organization that provides coastline wildlife interpretation to the general public at Coquille and Simpson Reef overlooks April - September, and supports school and other programs. They are a Friends Group of the Southern Oregon Coastal National Wildlife Refuges. Binnewies talk will be on Coastal Wildlife, including its abundance on Cape Blanco. He will address the elements of wildlife interpretation and some new citizen science programs which are easily available to anyone.



"how many millions of watts of light we do need at Circle K before the bad guys can't find it". If this bright light at night helps to deter crime, I'm all for it. In fact, safety and security lighting on anyone's property should be looked at as beneficial to the community, not just that individual. The argument that light will "show the criminals what you have and where it is at night" is fallacious because criminals will observe your property during the day to see what they can get into at night. If they come back to a well lit property, they will go elsewhere, so they won't be visible to property owners.

All community members are invited to the next meeting of the City Council at which the 'Dark Skies' Ordinance will be discussed. Your opinions are welcome as are your comments on the specific details of the ordinance. Copies of the Ordinance are available to all members of the community and you can pick up your copy from Patty at City Hall 555 W. 20th St. Port Orford.

The 'Dark Skies' Ordinance is the next low cost, high value step in a 14 year old community effort involving volunteers like Al Geiser and members of the Kalmiopsis Audubon Society, the Coos Curry Electric Co-op, and numerous private property owners. Thanks to their collective and cooperative efforts the dark skies of Port Orford have been protected and preserved from light pollution, also known as 'sky glow,' by the installation of 125 sky caps installed on public and private lights. Sky caps cover lights with a hood that prevents the light from shining skyward and directs the light downward.

Pick up a copy of the Ordinance to learn what it does and does not do, put the date of the Council meeting in your calendar, and bring your neighbors to participate in the public review process that is necessary to sustain 'good government,'

On Tuesday, January 12th, I attended a City Planning Commission meeting. In addition to the various commission personnel there were approximately 20 to 25 citizens (including 3 city councilors) present. I don't know why the other councilors were absent.... possibly family emergency, favorite TV show, or just a crushing lack of interest.

There were many interesting and valid comments made in favor of the Dark Skies Ordinance by the public, most especially Paul Geiser and Ann Vileisis. The only two who had reservations were a current councilor and an ex-councilor. If one were to consider their personal situations a question of possible conflicts of interest might arise.

After the period for public comment closed the Planning Commission did an excellent job examining all aspects of the original proposal, a revision which had been submitted, and other additional ideas and arrived at a very fair, well thought-out ordinance which was unanimously agreed upon.

It will now be presented to the City Council. The Planning Commission and Mike Murphy, City Manager, assured us that copies of the final proposed ordinance will be made available to the general public, free of charge, at City Hall.

Well, folks, we are almost there. With a lot of brains and a little but of luck

this will finally pass. We will no longer have the uncertainty of an unneighborly neighbor or uncaring builder depriving us of our night sky or our personal privacy. There will be NO light police, but there will be a provision in place to protect us if it becomes necessary.

CCEC Power Outage

At 2:16pm on Sunday, January 17, two of the Bonneville Power Administration (BPA) transmission lines serving the Gold Beach and Brookings areas opened up resulting in a power outage to approximately 12,000 Coos-Curry Electric (CCEC) customers. The cause of the outage was the failure of an overhead static wire on BPA's 230 kV high voltage transmission line that fell across the phase wires of the 230 kV line and an adjacent 115 kV line knocking both lines out of service. The downed lines were located near CCEC's Geisel substation approximately five miles north of Gold Beach.

BPA dispatched a line crew from their North Bend operations center arriving at the Geisel substation at around 6:30pm. The BPA line crew worked several hours to clear the static wire. The transmission lines were switched back into service at approximately 9:20pm.

Once BPA's transmission lines were energized, CCEC crews that were sta-

tioned at each substation began work to restore power. Substations were brought back on line in stages to prevent overloading the circuits due to expected load and the extended duration of the outage. Restoration of service was nearly complete by 10:00pm except for the Brookings Substation which took additional time to bring online due to the high load being served. Service was restored to all affected areas by 11:15pm Sunday evening with the exception of a few remaining minor outages.

Property Tax Deferral

Curry County Assessor Jim Kolen reports that the State of Oregon has a property tax deferral program which may provide assistance to some senior citizens with their property taxes.

In this program, the State of Oregon pays the property taxes for qualified applicants. Taxes must be paid back to the state when the property changes ownership or the owner moves.

Property owners must meet the following requirements to qualify for the property tax deferral: you must be 62 years old by April 15, own the property you are living in and first time applicants must have a total household income of less than \$38,500 in 2009.
