Port Orford Matters By Evan Kramer

Port Orford matters a lot to those of us who live here and even many who don't but who come to visit. It's the kind of place where if you visit it once and give the town and area a chance you'll want to come back for more. We may not get a lot of visits from politicians running for state office – yes, there is a gubernatorial primary election going on but not much news of it in Curry County. But to people like Bob Bailey Port Orford matters a lot.

Bob Bailey is someone who has been coming back to Port Orford for over 25 years. He works for the Oregon Department of Land Conservation and Development (DLCD) as the Coastal Management Project Director in their Salem office. He was the keynote speaker for the Port Orford Ocean Resources Team Water Festival last Friday night at the Port Orford Library in the Freedom of Speech Room.

Bailey is no stranger to the south coast having been raised in North Bend before heading out to other parts of the state. He has been involved in many land use issues in our area. In his spare time Bailey plays the washboard and got up on stage with the Eager Lips Novelty

Orchestra that played at the reception at the Community Building after his talk. When he gave his keynote speech he told those of us in the audience that he was very impressed by the life in this town as he drove in and through town. He noted that something was going on here and praised our incredible library which he had been given a tour of before his talk. He also mentioned the development at Battle Rock Park.

Bailey said Oregon was the first state to implement statewide planning goals for ocean resources. He said that the Oregon Ocean Policy Advisory Council has come up with the first territorial sea plan in 1994. He said by and large that most communities were not leading the discussion on ocean issues but that what happened down here led the way and showed it could be done in talking about the Marine Reserve issue. He said that the Port Orford Ocean Resource Team had led the way and that our community will see remarkable benefits. Bailey said through the ocean mapping program that Port Orford had set the example for other coastal communities. Port Orford has also led the way in community based fisheries movement.

Bailey referred to our marine economy as the economic engine for the whole town. He talked about the planned-for

ocean resource facility in Port Orford and said it was a terrific idea which will pay off over time. Bailey obviously thinks a lot of our little town as well as POORT and director Leesa Cobb who he signaled out for praise and said he was very proud to be here and attend the Water Festival.

The next day was the Water Festival at the Community Building and once again it seemed like nearly every student at Driftwood School attended. The building was packed with students, their parents and many booths and displays. The Oregon State Parks Department had a booth and challenged people to identify various water bugs. The Port Orford Watershed Council had five different noxious weeds on display and challenged people to identify them. There was face painting and games and in the American Legion Hall you could buy a most delicious fish taco or fish taco lunch. I know they were good because I had one and the fish they used was fresh fish caught locally and delivered to the Port of Port Orford. Some of it is then frozen for later sale but the important thing is it is local fish and you can taste the difference.

This Water Festival is the number one event for our younger people in Port

Orford. Most of our big ticket events at the Community Building and in the parks tend to focus more on adults than children. The Water Festival is aimed at the community's children so thank you POORT.

Smith Hosts Reception

David Brock Smith is running for Curry County Commissioner and on Sunday afternoon he held a reception and meet and greet with people at the Port Orford Library. Smith is one of three candidates on the May 20 ballot running for commissioner. This year for the first time the office is non-partisan so all three candidates run in the same primary election.

Smith talked for about half an hour on county issues with a lot of emphasis on the county's financial situation. Curry and many other Oregon counties rely on federal payments in lieu of timber cutting to finance county services and that amount is on a steep decline. Congress has reauthorized these payments a few years ago but only for four years and

now it's time to come up with a way to pay for county functions. Smith suggested that the federal government give some of its vast holdings of forest land in Curry County to the County for them to manage for sustainable timber harvests. This money would then be used to finance various county departments. Smith spoke in support of the law enforcement tax that will be placed on the November ballot. This would be for five years if passed and the money used only to pay for law enforcement services including the sheriff's department, juvenile and court system. Smith advocated that people living in the three cities in Curry County get a tax rebate on part of that levy since they are already paying for law enforcement services.

Audience members had their own ideas on how to raise funds for the county from raising the county property tax rate to a county sales tax. Curry County residents pay the second lowest county tax rate in Oregon.

David Smith is on the Port Orford City Council and is active in many other local organizations and is the manager of

the Port and Starboard restaurant. If he wins this election Smith would be the first person from North Curry County to serve as commissioner since the late 1980's. Smith said if he wins he will resign from the council and as president of the Chamber of Commerce as well as step aside from the family restaurant.

The food part of the reception which is always my favorite featured a delicious cake made by Brenda Dell of Delightful Cakes, Joan Van Blair made some of the other desserts, Deanna Kreuter did the veggie trays and Micki Snyder did the decorations. People enjoyed having a bite to eat as they continued talking county business with candidate Smith.



Can we vote for someone without discussing the issues they represent? Or elect a like-minded person who agrees with everything we say? What are your concerns for you, your family, and your country? Listen to TV or radio stations, read opposing papers or magazines to find the candidate that share your concerns.

Should just anyone run for office, or be elected to office? Shouldn't they achieve the same level of knowledge and experience in private life, as the positions they seek in government? Does their credentials/resume match the importance, the responsibility of the position? Are the resumes truthful, can we trust what they say?

I'm referring to all positions, City, County, State and Federal elections that require an understanding of the job. Such as legal issues, finances, or areas of expertise like law enforcement. OJT, (on the job training) doesn't work on positions that could have negative consequences.

Especially for those making decisions regarding our children's future; where do they stand on issues that could affect us for years? 3 Sentenced in Burglary

A Curry County jury in Circuit Court found Jeffrey Dale Rosenberry, case #09CR0430, guilty of Count 1, Burglary in the First Degree; Count 2, Burglary in the second degree, Count 3, Theft in the First Degree; Count 4, Unauthorized use of a vehicle, and Count 5, Theft in the first degree by receiving. The burglary occurred on June 4, 2009 at Elk Point near Ophir.

Count 5, Theft by Receiving, related to Mr. Rosenberry's possession of property stolen in Port Orford in May of 2009. The stolen items were left in his back-

pack at the scene of the burglary after he fled.

District Attorney Everett Dial tried the case on behalf of the State. The defendant was represented by Jim Gardner. Both co-defendants, Jerry James and Rick Phillips had earlier pled guilty to the burglary and testified in the trial. Dial called 16 witnesses included three Oregon State Police forensic scientists. Mr. Rosenberry has a prior conviction for Burglary in the Second Degree, Burglary in the First Degree, Theft in the First Degree, three convictions for Felony Assault, a conviction for attempting to elude the police, and a number of traffic crimes. Judge Cindy Beaman set

sentencing for Friday, April 16. The jury was unable to reach a decision on Count 6, possession of methamphetamine. The case was investigated by Curry County Sheriff Deputy Joel Hensley and Curry County Detective Dave Gardiner. An OSP trooper made the initial arrest when he spotted Rosenberry and Phillips walking on Highway 101 near the scene of the burglary. According to DA Everett Dial "The sheriff deputy, detective and OSP trooper and scientists all did a great job."

Rosenberry was sentenced to 98 months in state prison on Friday morning by Judge Beaman.



Last week member of North County Emergency Services personnel worked together to accomplish the daunting task of a recovery from a deep canyon past Rusty Butte. This location is approximately 25 miles up Sixes River. Members of Port Orford Community Ambulance, Sixes Fire, Langlois Fire and Curry County Sheriff's Office worked

together in seamless teamwork on a call that lasted over 4 hours. The terrain was steep and treacherous. The recovery was accomplished by ropes, a Stokes basket and an incredible amount of muscle. This multi-agency group worked together as though they had been training together for years for this type of incident. With the outstanding assistance of the Curry County Dispatchers, communication pre-arrival was excellent between agen-

cies; allowing for work to begin immediately upon arrival. The personnel had good weather, but had to be concerned with the quickly approaching evening darkness. After arriving on scene, it took a little more than a half an hour to reach the patient and then more than 2 hours to get back to the staging site.

All members of our community should be very proud and grateful to have such extraordinary men and women working on our Emergency Services agencies. This call was extreme. However, outstanding training, teamwork, skills, and camaraderie made a seemingly impossible task work perfectly.

Former Officer Pleads Guilty

Former Port Orford Police Officer John Fink pled guilty in Curry County Circuit court last week to one count of official misconduct which is a class A misdemeanor. He had also originally been charged with one count of theft in the second degree which is a class A misdemeanor. The theft charge had been dropped previously by the district attorney's office. Juvenile Court Decision

The judge in the case of Garry Doanne Jr. (age 17) found him “guilty” of all the charges against him except one count of burglary in the second degree. Juveniles cannot plead “guilty” or to be found “guilty”. Instead the court terminology regarding juvenile matters when sentencing them is to “be found within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court.” He was found guilty on one count of first degree arson, one count of first degree aggravated theft, three counts of second degree burglary, two counts of first degree criminal mischief and one count of second degree trespass. All these crimes were committed at Pacific High School from October 5-8, 2009. Doanne Jr. was ordered into the care and custody of the Oregon Youth Authority for placement in a Close Care Facility. He may be released after completing all of his court-ordered requirement and treatment programs but must be released no later than when he turns 25. Two other people charged in parts of this case – Dayland Wagner and Timothy Maynard testified for the state against Doanne Jr.
