

POORT Receives Award By Evan Kramer

The Port Orford City Council met on Thursday, June 3 with all present but Councilor David Smith who was in Salem. The council held a couple of mandated hearings; one for Revenue Sharing and the other for a Supplemental Budget Hearing. There was no public comment and no discussion on either issue. The State Revenue sharing funds are for \$9,815.

Mayor Jim Auburn spoke about the award given to the Port Orford Ocean Resources Team. It is the 2010 National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration award for Excellence for the Non-Governmental Organization of the Year. There is only one of these given out each year and this year POORT was awarded it. The NOAA excellence awards for Coastal and Ocean Management honor a nongovernment entity, such as a nonprofit organization, citizen's advisory council, friends group or foundation that has made significant contributions supporting coastal or marine reserve programs. Various POORT board members and others stood to take a round of applause from those attending the meeting. Later on POORT board member Chris Aiello said the award was for the whole community.

Kathy Boden spoke on behalf of the wetlands project in back of Driftwood School. She thanked the city council on behalf of the students for the City giving them the opportunity to study the wetlands. The students have done more than study them over the past two years and have helped clean them up and remove invasive plant species. Boden invited the council to a tour of the Driftwood Wetlands on Wednesday, June 9, which will be presented by the Fourth and Seventh Grade classes at Driftwood. Boden also displayed a large size poster with photos, etc. for the council which will be placed in the hallway wall at city hall.

Gary Wickham spoke to the council about energy use noting the ongoing oil spill off the coast of Louisiana. He spoke on ways to cut back on energy use and by doing that we could all do something to cut down the need for so much oil. He recommended recycling plastic grocery bags and using the new style fluorescent light bulbs.

Curry County Juvenile Department director Ken Dukek spoke about the four crews his department will be working this summer using Federal Stimulus money. He said the department would employ 19 young adults and three adults as crew leaders and that they were

available for projects in Port Orford as well as the rest of Curry County. He asked the council to come up with a project for one of the crews which will do their work from July 6 through August 26. Mayor Auburn suggested one crew do brush clearing on the city rights of way while another idea was for a crew doing painting work.

The council moved into New Business and by a 5-0 vote on Resolution 2010-12 adopted the Supplemental Budget for 2009-10. They then approved Resolution 2010-13 which covers worker's compensation for volunteers who do work for the city. They also passed Resolution 2010-15 to receive state revenue funds.

The council voted yes on Resolution 2010-17 which would allow the Port Orford Jubilee Committee to charge \$20 for vendors and concession stands over the July 2-4 Jubilee celebration.

The council voted 4-1 to approve a group of changes to the council rules which will reflect more accurately the city charter. Mayor Auburn noted that in order for the council to change the city charter all changes would have to go to a vote of the people. One change that was approved is that the Mayor

may by giving notice to the council call a special meeting of the council not earlier than three hours nor later than 48 hours before the meeting.

The council voted unanimously to approve adding the Fifth Street Water Line Extension to the Capital Improvement List. This will be a 6 inch fire suppression water line. It will terminate at a new fire hydrant on the Jefferson Street right of way adjacent to the cul-d-sac below the Battle Park main parking area. Eventually the plan is to bring the water line up Jefferson Street and loop it across the highway. City Administrator Mike Murphy said one of the goals of the public works department regarding water lines is to minimize dead end water lines which is currently the case with the Fifth Street water line. The water line extension work will be done by the city public works crew. The water line will connect to the Hawthorne property as it goes down Fifth Street and they will pay for the part of it to their hookup (approximately \$7,000) with the

city paying for the rest of line to the new hydrant. The primary purpose of the fire hydrant at the cul-de-sac will be serving as blow off point for the water line to remove debris in the line. A secondary purpose is for the fire department to use the fire hydrant for beach fires in the driftwood.

The council unanimously approved the consent calendar which included the meeting minutes for May 6 and May 20 and approving a request from Curry Transfer and Recycle to not raise their rates. CTR did not request a rate increase because the CPI was flat.

The Highway 101 clean up is set for Saturday, June 12, beginning at 9:00am. Councilor Tim Pogwizd expressed appreciation to the Oregon Department of Transportation crew that recently cleaned up the sidewalks and gutters in Port Orford.

Driver Safety Program

An AARP Driver Safety Program class will be offered on June 19 at the Port Orford Senior Center (1536 Jackson

Street). The program is cosponsored by Southwestern Oregon Community College and the Senior Center.

All attendees 55 or older who complete the Driver Safety Program Class are certified to receive a reduction in auto insurance from their insurance agent per Oregon state law, provided that all insured in the household are over 55 and have taken this class. Drivers who have previously taken the class and received auto insurance discounts are urged to renew their eligibility for reduced auto insurance rates by taking the class every three years if 69 years old or under and every two years if 70 or older.

Membership in AARP is not required for class attendance and the class is now open to all ages. The Driver Safety class reviews how to compensate for age-related changes thereby reducing traffic violations, crashes and chances for injury, in addition to discussing updated Oregon traffic laws.

Pre-registration is required and can be made by calling Southwestern at 247-2741. The cost of tuition is \$12 for AARP members, \$14 for non members, and includes a workbook and other materials. Class starts promptly at 9:00 a.m., concluding at 5 p.m.

Superintendent's Report By Mick Lane

It is not expressed to you enough how your support of the kids and staff at 2CJ is vital to the quality of education and community partnership that has been fostered in our District. The 2009/10 school year was tumultuous, uncertain, and in some cases, tragic.

It began with the broken water main at Driftwood that delayed the school opening by 4 days. The staff was absolutely the best. Many teachers were required to set up classrooms in dry parts of the complex while the restoration company worked day and night to get the school operating again.

This was followed in early October by an arson and burglary that could have cost us our high school, and again, teachers, students, and staff showed remarkable teamwork and flexibility as classes and schedules were disrupted. The negative effect on the morale of the students was significant with the most asked question being: "Why." Once again the maintenance and administrator teams' time was taken up by repairs, law enforcement, and insurance work.

During this time, the PHS math classes experienced multiple substitute teachers which hurt the continuity of instruction so essential to this subject area. Allegations of inappropriate behavior by a teacher continued the pattern of catas-

rophe and disruption of school life. In the spring Laurie Feldhaus died and created a deep loss, not only of a wonderful woman, but also a dedicated and child-centered instructional assistant.

The District was found to be out of compliance with DEQ water treatment regulations and received a fine for the violations, dipping into an already decimated budget.

The recession and Oregon's income tax based revenues brought on a crisis for everyone, especially public services. Schools receive the great majority of this State support and Districts had to budget on uncertain numbers. We developed next year's budget in a very conservative way, and even when the funding was projected to be higher than expected, we realized that in order to maintain present level services to kids and balance the 2010/11 budget it was necessary to cut over \$700,000 dollars (nearly 25% of our total budget). We expected to have a \$500,000 dollar carry-over at the end of this year, but every dime and more will need to be used. Teachers, support staff, materials, books, supplies, maintenance, basically all areas were impacted. We thought the

worst was over, but at the end of May we received another revenue forecast that would result in a 9% across the board cut in State funding. This resulted in another \$150,000 deficit to deal with. Again, people had their jobs reduced or eliminated.

All of these events eroded the public's view of our District and disheartened us all. Still our students continue to excel, and we will be fine. Last year was terrible and an anomaly. 2010/11 will be brighter and the June 4th graduation of another group of special young men and women brought everyone together for a celebration of hope for the future.

Police Chase

On 06-05-10 at about 9:45pm, two Officers from the Port Orford Police Department attempted to stop a vehicle in the city of Port Orford for a speeding violation and suspected DUII. The vehicle, a 1931 Ford Coupe driven by Gold Beach resident James Baldwin, date of birth of 11-15-1946, failed to stop for the officer's emergency lights and sirens and continued south on U.S. Highway 101 towards Gold Beach. An Oregon State Police Trooper took over as the lead pursuit officer near Prehistoric Gardens and continued south bound at speeds that ranged between fifty and sixty miles per hour.

A Patrol Lieutenant from the Curry County Sheriff's Office responded to near milepost 326 just north of Rogue Hills and north of Gold Beach, which is about twenty five miles south of Port Orford where the pursuit originated. At

the request of the pursuing officers, Stop Sticks were deployed which ultimately deflated three of the four vehicle tires, leaving the left rear tire un-damaged. Baldwin continued to operate his disabled vehicle south on Highway 101 for a couple miles and entered into the city limits of Gold Beach. Baldwin turned east onto Eighth Street and then turned into his driveway where he was ordered out of his car at gun point. Baldwin got out of his car, refused to follow verbal commands by police and turned and began to walk away at which time a Taser was used to incapacitate Baldwin. Baldwin was taken into custody without further incident by the

Oregon State Trooper and a Gold Beach City Police Officer.

Baldwin was transported and booked into the Curry County Jail by the Port Orford Police Department on several charges including Attempt to Elude and DUII.

Money Matters at PO Library By Tobe Porter, Director

Money certainly does matter, especially these days. At the Port Orford Public Library where the price of doing business is on the rise, the cost of a year's subscription to People Magazine is \$116, a book on CD is \$30 (library rate), a printer cartridge for the public computers is \$156 and the reduced price for the Wall Street Journal is \$119.

The Budget Committee approved the proposed 2010-2011 budget. As one Library Board member said, “This budget is already at bare bones, now we're picking at the enzymes.” Staff received a 3% raise, giving the Library Director (at ¾ time) an annual salary of \$23,000 and the three other part-time staff (all of whom also volunteer) a combined salary of \$33,195. Cuts were made in the areas of training, programs, audio/visual, and books for children. We know we will be working under tight budget constraints until our endowment fund is large enough to generate interest for general operating expenses. That's why we're watching our pennies (your property tax dollars) very carefully.

These figures make it clear why we are fortunate to have a dedicated, trained corps of 16 front desk volunteers. Without them we would be open fewer hours and without all our volunteers, we would not be able to offer such a

NOAA is pleased to honor American people and organizations for outstanding



School's Out for Summer

Port Orford-Langlois School District students end the 2009-10 school year on Friday, June 11. School's out for summer.

Timothy Maynard Trial

The three day trial of 20 year old Timothy Maynard, for the burglary and arson at Pacific High School, ended on Friday, June 4, 2010. The 12 person jury convicted Maynard of Aggravated Theft, a "B" felony, for the theft of the laptop computers stolen from the school and two separate counts of Burglary in the Second Degree, both "C" felonies, for his entry, on two separate occasions, into buildings at the school. The jury did not convict him of Arson, but instead convicted him of a lesser included offense of Reckless Burning. Deputy District Attorney, Bob Meyer, tried the case for the State and defense attorney Steven Abbott represented the defendant. District Attorney Everett Dial, stated that Bob Meyer did a good job in trying the case and noted that juries are not required to give explanations of how or why they reach a verdict nor are they allowed to talk to the attorneys who try the case after the trial is over. The defendant did appear to be remorseful during the trial, and he readily confessed to what he had done. Both the co-defendants were juveniles and their cases were handed by the juvenile court prior to Mr. Maynard's trial. The fire and thefts cost the School over \$100,000 in damages and losses. Sentencing for Maynard is set for Thursday, June 10, at 9:00am.

Hospice Market Place

Volcanoes & Evolution

Retired geologist Janet L. Brown returns to North Curry to present two programs this coming weekend. On Saturday, June 12, Brown will talk to us about evolution and adaptations to a changing world. This hour-long presentation will particularly focus on horse found in the John Day Fossil Beds. The lecture will be followed by a "lab" where participants will look at replicas of actual horse skulls and study evolutionary changes. This program will be held at 1PM at the Langlois Lions Hall.

The following day, Sunday, June 13, Brown will give us a one-hour PowerPoint presentation on volcanic

Ms. Brown spent last summer crawling around several volcanoes in Hawaii and can give us an up close and personal report of what's happening in the volcanic world. Janet Brown is a casually retired geologist who worked as a stratigrapher and sedimentologist for the U.S. Geological Survey, Dept. of Interior. She is also a Ranger Naturalist for the National Park Service, and the author of many research articles and popular science reports.

CCEC Board Discusses Rates

The Coos Curry Electric Cooperative board of directors considered eight different scenarios for implementing the second half of the rate increase that was effective last October during their May board meeting. Scenarios ranged from implementing the full 7.5 percent increase in October 2010 as originally discussed with the membership to splitting the increase and implementing 4 percent in October 2010 and the remainder in 2011. "You'll recall that we announced the need for a 15 percent rate adjustment last year, of which 12 to 13 percent was directly related to an increase in the price of wholesale power," General Manager/CEO Roger Meader told the board. After an extensive review of revenue requirements needed for the next two years, financial parameters that had to be met for mortgage and banking requirements and the timing of capital project expenditures such as the transmission line upgrade, the board elected to implement the rate increase in stages. The first 7.5 percent increase was effective October 1, 2009 and the
