There is exciting news for Port Orford and North Curry County. Shirley Nelson's much anticipated book in the Images of America series "Port Orford and North Curry County" has been published and will be for sale this week. The book is published by Arcadia Publishing and it is one of hundreds they have published in their Images of America series. I have many books in this series which range from a book on Hollywood history, Route 66, Culver City to Detroit movie theaters, Coney Island, and of course many, many about much smaller areas of the country. Now Port Orford and North Curry County join this great series of books put out by Arcadia Publishing. The books are heavy on photos but each one is accompanied by a thorough description and Shirley Nelson meticulously researched her book on Port Orford and North Curry County.

"Port Orford and North Curry County" is for sale at our store and many others and will retail for \$21.99. The book's author Shirley Nelson will participate in signings for her newest book at the Port Orford Library, Hughes House and the Cape Blanco Lighthouse gift store.

Though more of the book is about Port Orford, North Curry County is covered well in photos and text including the Sixes Cheese Factory (burned down and long gone), the Langlois Blue Star cheddar cheese factory (burned down in 1957), and lots of information on Langlois (once known as Dairyville) and the dairy industry which is all but gone; and the Sixes Store back when it was in business. Highway 101 (aka the Roosevelt Highway) is covered as it is our only practical way in and out of North Curry County and there is good coverage of our number one resource the Port of Port Orford including a photo of a cannery worker in the 1970's; back when they canned fresh caught crab in five pound cans. Now that building is home to Norcal Fisheries which buys and sells live fish. It's startling to see the photo of SS Frogner docked at the Port of Port Orford taking on a load of logs as the steamship was 52 feet wide and 400 feet long and that would be impossible today.

Nelson's book covers the economic evolution of Port Orford from mining, timber harvesting and mills, and lumber exporting from the Port to the agricultural history of North Curry County. One thing is apparent and that is that North Curry County is in a constant process of change.

Where to Eat in Port Orford

We were standing around the pickle barrel at the Fun Zone (figuratively speaking) and talking about how many restaurants there are in Port Orford. I thought we still had about ten without counting but when we were through naming them all we came up with 12 places from the Port and Starboard Restaurant which is the oldest continuously operated eatery to the newest restaurant which is the Redfish at Battle Rock Park. In between there is Paula's Bistro, the Crazy Norwegians, Pitch's Tavern, Griffs at the Dock, Jutta's Kitchen, Circle K which has a deli, Ray's Market which as a deli, the Siren's Cove, the Hard Rain Café and the Paradise Café. Some might argue that some of the named places are not restaurants per se but they are all places where you can go and buy a variety of prepared foods and All have something unique and different to offer from Pitches Tavern's cheeseburgers to Circle K tacos, Hard Rain pizzas, Crazy Norwegian's fish and chips, Paradise Café's big breakfasts and Port and Starboard's home made desserts and on and on.

Port Orford is full of ghosts of restaurants that have been a big part of

the town but no longer exist from the Wheelhouse Restaurant at Battle Rock Park, The Rainbow in the Sixes River Land Company Building, Orford's Restaurant which is where the new Hawthorne Gallery has opened, The Truculent Oyster which morphed into Spaghetti West and then Paula's Bistro, The Golden Owl Deli which was one of my favorites in the summer of 1990 when we moved here, Bartlett's (once known as Lyle's Confectionary) which featured homemade doughnuts, and a choice of seating from tables to stools, to booths before it was destroyed in a fire in 1999. It was replaced in a new building by the Wild Wind Café which is now closed, several restaurants at the Port Orford Inn though none are there now, and that's just a brief overview of the last 20 years.

Langlois is home to two of my favorite places to eat; one with the great name of the Greasy Spoon and then there's the Langlois Market Deli and their Hammer sandwiches and of course the

Langlois Market hot dogs with that special mustard and pickles. At times the Sixes Store had a restaurant in it but the building is now closed other than the post office.

Shirley Nelson's book covers many of the former restaurants of Port Orford with photos from Collin's Grill to the Castaway by the Sea Lodge restaurant, the Knapp Hotel restaurant, Vi's Café and Katie's Café. My advice is see the book for yourself because this is just a small overview of our local history.

**Redfish Restaurant and
Hawthorne Gallery**

While visiting Port Orford, I was fortunate enough to have the pleasure of visiting the Redfish restaurant that has just opened in town. The dining experience at the Redfish is not complete without visiting the adjacent Hawthorne gallery of modern art. Let me tell you, this is really something special.

First, I must tell you how much I enjoy this lovely coastal town. I feel I have found home. Yes the wind is a little high, but the people here are charming, the views are breathtaking. You always have a sense when you meet people in Port Orford that just below the surface are the most amazing stories, hidden talents and rich resourcefulness that gives this town many vibrant layers to explore.

Redfish seems to have captured the very best of Port Orford: from the Indian influences in the stone sculptures and rock face designs, to the simple elegance of the metal décor and wood slatted ceilings. I must say, Port Orford, you are lucky to have so many artists of such fine quality. The fine art in the Gallery shows talent more exciting to me than those modern art museum pieces I have seen of late in the “big city.” Stunning expressions of the human soul touched by the natural world—it is a cultural expression of where we are at this moment in time: a mix of cultures collected and aptly placed.

The high sense of appreciation, care and exquisite attention to detail carries over to the Redfish restaurant where the ambiance is ideal. Located on the 101 with a perfect ocean view, you can see Battle Rock from nearly every seat in the house. I have no doubt it’s the best place to see whale jumping while eating your breakfast! Protected from the howling wind, you can enjoy moderately priced and completely delicious treats at every

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meal. When I say “moderately priced” I mean even I could afford to eat there a couple of times a week. This is no stuck-up exclusivity; this is for real; down-to-earth artists who have created a restaurant so you can enjoy the food and the surrounds. The servers are beautiful and pleasant, the food is—so good you have to stop yourself from eating too much. And the menu is sophisticated in a warm and welcoming way.

The care and attention to every detail of your experience makes this a wonderful experience that will attract visitors (especially golfers, hikers, artists and Oregon coast appreciators) and invite them to stop and stay for awhile to learn more of what it has to offer. It sets a standard of how Port Orford greets its visitors: with a wisdom and appreciation for our environment that runs deep, with an attitude that is so impressive anyone will drop their jaw in wonder.

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Dealing with Black Bears

Black bears are being seen more frequently in western Oregon this summer. The Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife has some tips to avoid problems with bears.

“Here on the coast, the salmonberry crop never came on in many places and the blackberries are not ripe yet,” said Stuart Love, wildlife biologist in the Charleston field office. “Berries aren’t the only thing bears can eat right now, but that’s what they want. They’re hungry and looking for an easy meal which is usually garbage or pet food left outside of homes.”

“Remember the right thing to do is to leave bears wild. They must rely on natural food sources,” continued Love. “Bears that come to expect food from humans become safety risks.”

In Coos Bay and the mid-coast district, several bears have been killed for human safety and damage reasons. Damage complaints have increased in the southern Willamette Valley and North Coast. The Klamath district also reports bear problems.

In the Rogue Watershed, Wildlife Biologist Rosemary Stussy fields calls from homeowners with bear problems ranging from ransacked garbage to bears breaking and entering homes. “Bears have killed small farm animals, and now

for the second year in a row, bears have torn up one resident’s archery range.”

She asks landowners to do their part and practice good bear etiquette.

“People must make sure they don’t attract bears to their property,” Stussy said. “Neighbors need to work together to make sure everyone is doing what they can to keep bears out.” She offered the following tips for homeowners:

Keep garbage inside. Pour ammonia or bleach over the trash before leaving it outside for pick-up.

Store pet food dishes and feed inside.

Hang bird feeders away from the side of your home or tree trunk so bears can’t reach them. Store birdseed inside and keep the feeder and area underneath clean.

Keep barbecue grills clean.

Pick up fruit that has fallen from trees.

Bear hunting season opened Aug. 1 statewide. Landowners with bear damage that desire hunters on their property should contact their local [ODFW field office](#).

Oregon is home to about 25,000 to 30,000 bears. Sightings are not unusual, but attacks on humans are rare. Following are ODFW tips if a person encounters a bear:

Give the bear a way to escape.

Stay calm, do not run or make sudden movements.

Face the bear and back away slowly.

Avoid direct eye contact with the bear.

Talk to the bear in a firm voice to let it know you are a human.

Fight back if attacked. Shout, use rocks, sticks and hands to fend off an attack.

The Port Orford-Langlois 2CJ School District once again made Adequate Yearly Progress in state standards for every category measured. You can view our AYP report, and every Oregon district at:

The drop down box on the left lets you choose the district, then click on "AYP Report: on the right. You can also look at our history. In the 8 years that these reports have come out, Port Orford/Langlois School District has been the only district on the south coast to meet AYP every year.

The only blemish to our perfect record was in 2006/07 when Driftwood School missed the attendance target by .4%.

Powers joined us as the only other District to meet AYP in every area. The other Districts on the south coast did not do so well and face some extra work to raise their scores. Our success speaks to the advantages of small schools, but more importantly, to the quality of teachers and staff we have working for our kids.

Fiber Art Exhibit at Library

The walls of the Port Orford Library lobby and art wall are alive with color. Come see for yourself; come see the work by Quilters Pat Chittenden and Bev Webb and Rugmaker Leonard Webb.

I'm not sure it is artistically correct to say these quilters work "outside the box," but it is accurate to say Pat and Bev do not produce ordinary quilts. Each one calls for a closer look, not only at the meticulous quilting, but also at the depth of subject and wealth of color.

As for the rugs--Leonard now uses the authentic early American Technique of

Curry County Veterans Memorial Association, Inc. (CCVMA)

We are actively seeking design ideas for the memorial.

Design parameters for the memorial are:

The dimensions of the site are approximately 60 ft long X 40 ft deep. (2400 square foot) That means we have 2400 sq. ft of space to develop a combination of walk ways, seating, statues if applicable, one or more places to engrave the names of our fallen, by war, by military service or what ever is best suited for the site.

Begin with a wall no more than 48 inches high, extending the entire length on the back section of the site. This is primarily for safety reasons to prevent visitors from sliding into the river, but must be incorporated into the design. The site must have wheel chair accessibility.

All branches of the services must be recognized, including Merchant Marines, Coast Guard, and special consideration for POW/MIA.

There are also plans to incorporate those fallen heroes from the protective services (law enforcement, fire, etc.) in an area separate from the veteran's portion of the memorial. The center will remain military remembrance only.

All emblems representing all branches should be included in the design; flags should be limited due to cost of replacement.

Redfish Rocks FAQ's

Note: FAQ's stands for frequently asked questions.

What activities are not allowed in the Redfish Rocks Marine Reserve?

In the reserve all extractive activities are prohibited, including fishing, crabbing, and other removal of living marine resources. 'Disturbing' activities such

as ocean dumping, habitat degradation and mining are also prohibited.

What activities are not allowed in the marine protected area?

The same prohibitions apply as in the previous question, except that salmon trolling and crabbing are allowed.

Is transitioning through the reserve allowed?

Yes, as long as fishing gear is not deployed.

The rules and regulations for Redfish Rocks Research Reserve and Marine Protected Area will go into effect in June 2011.

The enthusiastic welcoming crew had many questions for the newly arrived paddler. Margo was asked many questions about her expedition on the ocean. One greeter asked Margo what the biggest conditions she had been in were. She replied Walapa Bay. Another asked if she has ever flipped her canoe. She replied that she had, mostly coming in and going out. Margo had a couple stops on the way that kept her for a few days and her longest stay was one week

in Westport, WA. She was able to paddle out of Port Orford the morning after her arrival and after a tough paddle, made it to Gold Beach safely.

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CCHHH News

A new freestanding, non-profit home health and hospice program is just under one year away from bringing its services to Curry County. The anticipated date is July 2, 2011, when Coastal Home Health and Hospice will seamlessly take over providing services currently offered by Curry Home Health and Hospice.

Due to increased costs, reimbursement changes and diminishing funding the need for a free standing, non-profit agency became evident in January of 2009. A committee, consisting of community volunteers, Advisory Board members and liaison County Commissioner Georgia Nowlin, was charged with the task of completing Freestanding Feasibility Study. The committee analyzed the benefits and risks of transitioning from Curry County Home Health Hospice from a County Department to a freestanding entity.

Based on the findings and recommendations of the committee, the Board of Commissioners voted unanimously in March of this year to begin the transition.


