Your Health Matters By Evan Kramer

The Curry Health District board of directors met in Port Orford last Wednesday at the Senior Center. The board meets once a month on the last Wednesday of each month and once every six months in Port Orford. The Health District boundaries go from Airport Road on the North to Pistol River on the south. The Health District operates Curry Family Medical Center in Port Orford, Shore Pines assisted living facility in Gold Beach, Curry General Hospital in Gold Beach and the Curry Medical Center in Brookings.

The \$13.5 million Curry Medical Center in Brookings opened on February 27 of this year and is the crown jewel of the health district. It includes an urgent care facility which is open Monday through Saturday from 8:00am to 8:00pm.

The health district board opened their Wednesday meeting with an announcement that Dr. Fitz will be the new chief of staff at the hospital. He is an OB-GYN doctor with lots of experience and an ability to deal with the public.

Board member Harry Hoogesteger spoke about a recent visit to the Curry Medical Center planting a variety of plants for the bioswale in the medical

center's parking lot. CEO Bill McMillan helped out with the planting. Hoogesteger said this would be his last meeting as a board member as he won't be available for the June meeting and did not run for another term this year. He will be replaced by Marlyn Shafer from Gold Beach. Later on in the meeting CEO McMillan thanked Hoogesteger and said he was a great board member.

CEO McMillan discussed EmCare Services under new business. He spoke of the challenges in the emergency room at Curry General Hospital. McMillan recommended giving EmCare Services a contract to run and operate the emergency room at Curry General Hospital. EmCare would staff the emergency room but for now use the five doctors currently in rotation in the emergency room. McMillan said that EmCare Services standards are high and they have a particularly good customer service program. He went on to say hiring EmCare would cost \$200,000 more than what the district is currently spending on the emergency room. McMillan "hinted" at a big lawsuit settlement over an emergency room problem but whatever it was it was handled in the executive session prior to the meeting.

McMillan said that EmCare would do their own billing, pay the doctors and

handle all the receivables from the emergency room. McMillan said though EmCare would keep the current doctors on in the emergency room that only one or two would remain after a while. An EmCare doctor will oversee all activity that goes on the ER. The board passed a motion by Gary Anderson to contract out the emergency room to EmCare, pay them \$300,000 plus all receivables. There is a 90 day termination in the contract if CHD wants to end the contract.

Tom Soule, Director of Nursing at the hospital, said they are working on improvements for preventing patients from falling which is a problem and getting the staff to answer the patient "light" faster.

The management agreement to run Shore Pines with Woolard-Ibsen is up for termination or renewal and the board decided not to renew the contract with that company and take over managing the facility themselves. The amount of people living at Shore Pines had gone down as this facility competes with Macklyn House and Sea View in Brookings. The district will need someone licensed to run an assisted living facility. CEO Bill McMillan will attend classes and gain the proper license for operating an assisted living care facility and

the district will be kosher on running Shore Pines.

Chief Financial Officer Mark Saylor said the health district balance sheet looks good. The Health District made a profit of \$85,000 in April.

The District is still looking for a Nurse Practitioner/Physician Assistant to replace the position lost at Curry Family Medical Center when Sandra Johnson left last year. Curry Family Medical Center brought in \$35,157 in April of this year while last year in April it produced revenues of \$59,335 with two health care providers working there. Bill McMillan made things much more clear than what was talked about at the board meeting when he sent me the following statement: "We have been searching for a Full Time/40 hours (4 ten hour days) Nurse Practitioner/Physician Assistant. Our preference is to find a female. We have had no applicants and have added a sign on bonus as well as increased the compensation to \$130,000 per annum." Good luck and hope they are success-

ful soon in finding someone to assist Dr. Tom Pitchford at the clinic and thus making it easier for people to get in when they have an emergency or urgent need.

Letter To The Editor,

What's to hide?

The County Commissioners are planning to take over ownership of the Cape Blanco Airport, set an Oregon precedent of converting State Park land to private development, and spend money on an ill-fated scheme. And they're not telling us about it.

The extent of notification has been a cryptic two-line announcement offered less than two days before our officials quietly voted for a decision of great importance and budgetary consequence.

Excellent coverage by the Curry County Reporter emphasized the commissioners and their legal counsel's caveat that the effort is simply exploratory, but that's not what the approved action says. It bluntly states that that the county "has agreed to pursue the transfer of the Cape

Blanco Airport from the State of Oregon to Curry County."

Since our commissioners are not talking, why not call 800 243-1996 or 541 247-3296. Ask what they're doing. Maybe they'll tell you, as they told me, that they want ownership because our near-bankrupt county with its laid-off employees will be more capable of investing millions in improvements at the airport than is the state. Maybe they'll tell you that they have plans to make money from a golf course after committing millions in public assets for sweetheart deals. But they'll probably just tell you that this will be aired at the "appropriate" time. That means after the dealings are done and commitments of our precious tax dollars are made on an enterprise as foolish as any effort to hide from the people who vote.

Letter To The Editor,

In last week's paper a supporter of the proposed 28,000 acre Elk River Salmon Emphasis Area responded to my letter questioning the need for such a project. After providing some preliminary cheerleading for the plan's main promoter, he stated that this proposal will not restrict the use of public lands. A review of the conditions of this plan indicate otherwise. For example, spur roads in the designated area would be "decommissioned." I interpret this to mean they would no longer be maintained and would become unusable for hunters, campers and hikers. It would also appear that future logging in this area would be severely impacted. Additionally, there would be a prohibition against future, perhaps even current mining interests. While these public land uses are legitimate they are viewed as distasteful and inappropriate by many environmentalists.

So let's be clear, this proposal as currently presented will absolutely result in restrictions to the public's use of land within this area. I also have a concern that this plan may be simply the first step in obtaining a more restrictive designation in the future. While the plan may actually have some merit, what is still lacking is objective and scientific research regarding the various aspects of the plan. Simply living along the river or guiding upon it does not make one

This Week in The Garden By Jennifer Ewing

For those of you who don't have garden space at your home, it's still possible to grow Something to enjoy. Anything that holds soil and drains can be used. Buckets with holes punched in the bottom, old wash tubs, wine barrels, wooden crates, bales of straw with holes dug out of the straw...are a few of the many containers that you can make do.

Determine the available sunlight in your yard, porch or patio growing area, fill the container of your choice with good soil and compost and place your plants in the container or sow the seed that you have chosen. If you have at least six hours of full sun, plant a tomato plant or some herbs that you like to use in your cooking. If you have light shade (less than full sun), salad greens, spinach, and other greens will do fine. If you prefer to have the color of flowers to brighten your day, plant your container to overflowing with tightly spaced plants. An-

nuals will give you color all season and one or two perennials will give you added texture and height.

I've never lived anywhere, in a house, an apartment or trailer where I didn't grow Something. It takes very little effort and rewards you with a bit or food or flower. You never know, it just might inspire you to have Two containers next year!

For the people who think they won't be able to afford to vote "yes" on the water proposal, I want to say that I really understand that. It means a 2% increase in property taxes and \$23 a month more on our water bills. But what doesn't seem to sink in is the glaring truth that if we wait, it will cost even more. Some say we need to research the problem more, but if you have attended the information meetings you know that our problem with crumbling water pipes has been studied for years. We've had in depth financial, engineering and legal consultations. We know the problem, we needed a solution and now that it's here, we are diffident. Here it is. We learned that it is more costly and even illegal to patch work the problem or do it in stages. There is no reason not to trust this information that has been researched by reliable, professional people who have tried hard to get the best deal available for Port Orford. They are not trying to put one over on us. If we don't pass the measure and take advantage of a very good opportunity for financial help, the cost of fixing the water problem doubles. Paying to fix it on our own will be prohibitive. If we don't have reliable water, Port Orford stores, schools, homes will suffer. We don't have to go downhill, we can be responsible, make a sacrifice and help take care of our great little town.

Caregivers Support Group

Marine Education Center

During the next several weeks, members of the community are being asked to participate in the continued discussion on ways to make the planned new Port Orford and Marine Education Center a sustainable center. A Public Outreach Questionnaire is being circulated throughout the community asking the community who they are think the key partners might be for the new center. There are a number of partners, at different levels. Some will occupy the center; while many will provide information at the center and many will be provide technical assistance in a number of ways.

The Questionnaire identifies the top five partners, which could be potential key occupants. Obviously the City of Port Orford Parks Commission is the first, in that, it has managed the Visitor Center for many years. The Port Orford and North Curry County Chamber of Commerce has leased a portion of the Visitor Center. The Port Orford Ocean Resource Team has been the leader, along with the City of Port Orford to explore the possibility of building an expanded Port Orford Visitor and Marine Education Center; therefore it is a key occupant. The Redfish Rocks Community Team and the newly re-organized Cape Blanco Heritage Society are possible occupants.

Umpqua Community Development Corporation is in the process of preparing a Strategic Plan for the development, operation and maintenance of the new Port Orford and Marine Education Center. The Strategic Plan is over 50% complete and is planned for completion in July. A major part of the Strategic Plan is to identify ways to make the new Center Sustainable. Key to achieving that goal is good leadership, maximizing partnerships, within the walls of the new Center as well as partnerships outside the wall of the new Center. Maximizing efficiency and maximizing the amount of information and services is key. The last and most important is Community support and involvement.

The Public Outreach Questionnaire will be handed out at all City Council and City Commission Meetings and other public meetings and gatherings. Stephanie Webb, Ecosystem Programs Director, with the POORT and Jim Billings, Chair of the Port Orford Planning Commission and Manager of the Visitor Center will be coordinating to distribution and collection of the questionnaires. The questionnaire will be available at the Port Orford City Hall, the Library, the POORT Office, the Visitor Center, the Port Orford and North Curry County Chamber of Commerce, the Redfish Rocks Community Team Office and the Cape Blanco Heritage Society. You can complete the form and leave them at any of these locations.
